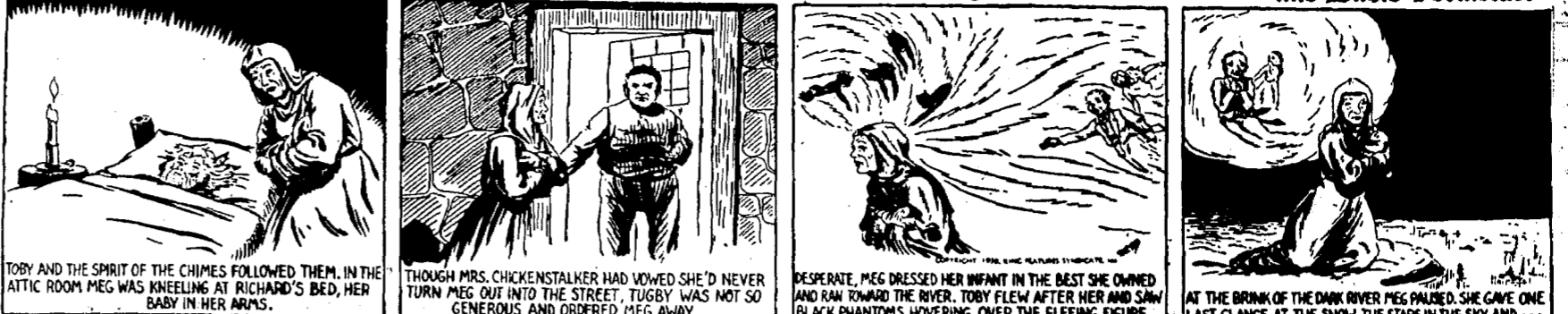

Giles, McCarthy and Vander Meer Named as Tops

ST. LOUIS (U.P.) - The three No. 1 men of the 1938 major leagues as announced today by baseball's newspaper, the Sporting News, were: Executive: Garren C. Giles, vice-president and general manager of the Cincinnati Reds. Manager: Joseph McCarthy, who piloted the New York Yankees to their third straight world series championship. Player: Johnny Vander Meer, who set an all-time big league record by pitching two consecutive no-hit, no-run games for Cincinnati. The corresponding minor league honors went to Lou McKenna, secretary and business manager of the St. Paul American Association club who was credited with the team's rise from seventh place in 1937 to the pennant in 1938; Paul Richards, manager of the Atlanta club which won the Southern Association playoff and Dixie series championships; and Fred Hutchinson, Seattle Pacific Coast League pitcher purchased recently by the Detroit Tigers for \$50,000 and several players, who won 25 games and lost only seven during the season.

Army-Navy Tilt at Chicago, Plea

KANKAKEE, Ill. (U.P.) - Kankakee renewed with new vigor today a movement to have the 1939 Army-Navy football game played at Chicago so all residents of Kankakee would have a chance to see two native sons in action. One is Cadet Harry Stella, captain of the 1939 Army team, the other, Midshipman Allen Bergner, captain of the 1939 Navy eleven. They played together on the Kankakee high school team. Shortly after they were elected to lead the service teams, citizens here sought to have the 1939 game transferred from Philadelphia to Chicago. The clamor died down after officials of both schools explained they were under contract. But Tuesday night the community honored the boys at a banquet and the movement was launched once more. Stella and Bergner were presented with gold watches and heard Gen. Robert Wood, president of Sears-Roebuck co., an alumnus of West Point, urge that every possible effort be made to have the game transferred to Chicago. Commander George D. Hull of the Great Lakes naval training station, representing the navy, Mal Elward, Purdue coach, Roy J. Hammes, president of the Kankakee chamber of commerce, and Charles Harrison, who coached Stella and Bergner in high school, all joined in Gen. Wood's suggestion.

Cubs Take Bartell, Mancuso Contracts

CHICAGO (U.P.) - The Chicago Cubs announced Tuesday they had taken over the 1939 contracts signed by Shortstop Dick Bartell and Catcher Gus Mancuso before they were traded by the New York Giants to the Cubs. Outfielder Hank Leiber, third man obtained by the Cubs in the deal which sent Shortstop Bill Jurgens, Catcher Ken O'Dea and Outfielder Frank Demaree to New York, has not signed his contract yet. Terms of the Bartell and Mancuso contracts were not revealed.

Henderson to Coach Lions

LOS ANGELES (U.P.) - Elmer (Gloomy) Gus Henderson today became the new head coach of the Detroit Lions of the National Professional Football league. Henderson, coach of the Los Angeles Bulldogs for the past two seasons, has defeated visiting National league clubs regularly in games with his independent squad. George Richards, owner of the Lions, announced at Palm Springs that he had signed Henderson but did not indicate the terms of the contract. He said that "it is for a long time." Henderson formerly coached teams at Southern California and Tulsa university.

CHICAGO (U.P.) - Clyde A. Storer, secretary of the National Billiard Assn., announced today that the 1939 world's three-cushion billiard championship would be conducted on a round-robin basis in nine cities to enable a larger number of persons to see the games. He said New York City, Chicago, Philadelphia, Kansas City, Buffalo, Cleveland, Detroit, and Kenosha, had been selected and that one more city would be chosen in the near future. The championship has been decided in one city in the past. Storer said the round-robin schedule calls for 360 tie games, 36 matches being carded for each
