Zinc Aids Animal Growth

Zinc, needed for plant life and growth, has been proven now to be needed by animals too.

Experiments conducted at the University of Wisconsin with the aid of the Wisconsin Alumni Research foundation, have removed doubt of the importance of zinc in animal growth and health.

Young rats were used in making the tests, and investigators report that rats fed, a ration low in zinc stopped growing at one-third the weight of normal rats.

In seeking for an explanation for this, the Wisconsin scientists discovered that rats which were fed low zinc rations usually passed large amounts of nitrogen, a muscle and tissue builder, through their bodies. This finding led Hart and his

associates to investigate. They learned that the pancreas is pow-erless to break down proteins which contain the nitrogen, when the food contains a low zinc content. They concluded that zinc is needed to produce digestive juices in the pancreas to act upon the

This discovery has pointed to a belief that zinc is required also by the pituitary gland, a growth gland in the body that controls the juices in the pancreas.



Who's Who Among Wisconsin Birds



The American Woodcock, a long famous and much-prized game bird, is a Wisconsin summer resident breeding throughout the state. At no time very common in Wisconsin, bird students wonder if it may not be on the way to extinction, regardless of stringent hunting regulations, because of the destruction of its thickest type of habitat.

The bird's general range is eastern United States and eastern southern Canada to Nova Scotia, west to the Dakotas, eastern Colorado and to eastern Manitoba in Canada. It breeds throughout this range and south to the Gulf states. It winters from southern Missouri, Ohio Valley, southern New Jersey south to Texas and Central Florida.

The American Woodcock is of stock build, yellowish brown below and with a dead leaf pattern above. It has a long bill, eyes high in the

head. It is found in low woods and wooded swamps. It matches the color of a forest floor of dead leaves so well that it is difficult to see. This bird builds its nest on

low ground among dead leaves, usually in alder, willow or brush thickets, but it may also be found on wooded or brushy upland not far from wet lowland. The nest is a hollow in the ground, lined with dead leaves. Its food consists almost en-

tirely of earthworms when they are available, the bird boring into the ground to get them. In dry times when earthworms cannot be reached, it feeds on insects, larvae, grubs, ants, slugs, etc.
