Publicity Will Pay State, Claim

Favorable publicity is needed to obtain for Wisconsin its rightful share of income from "recreational travelers," the Madison and Wisconsin Foundation maintained

The foundation bulletin pointed out that Wisconsin was 12th among 15 top ranking states last year in expenditures by visitors, as tabulated by the United States travel bureau. The record showed \$125,950,000 spent in Wisconsin compared with \$294,900,000 ir Ohio and \$283,600,000 in Illinois.

"Why," the bulletin asks, "should Ohio get almost two and a half times as much as the Badger state, far-famed as Wisconsin is for its recreational attractions? And why, too, does our neighbor, Illinois, get almost twice as much as Wisconsins Probably 'Chicago' answers that, but think of how many citizens come to Wisconsin each year from Chicago.

"Here is something for us all to give careful thought to. We want much to increase the total income of Wisconsin in order to add to the prosperity and welfare of its people. Surely, then, here is one real opportunity well within our reasonable grasp to secure another \$25,000,000 each year. Some would probably raise that estimated figure to a possible \$50,000.


"The answer is probably to be found in one word, 'publicity,' for Wisconsin and for Madison; then more 'publicity,' then still more, especially favorable 'publicity'."

SPOTTED SANDPIPER (TIP-UP)

The Spotted Sandpiper is the most common and generally distributed of the summer residents of the Wasconsin shore bird group. It gets its nickname from its peculiar habit of tipping its body.
