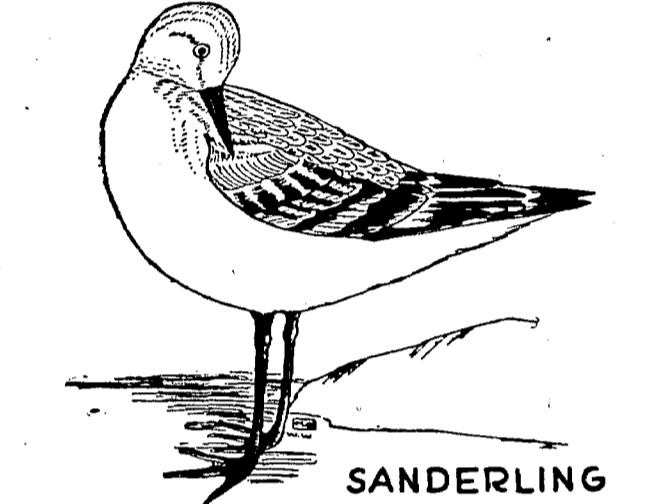

El Chico Has Bright Future as 3-Year-Old

By LOU BINDMAN NEW YORK (INS)—Not very long ago some of the leading track handicappers and official prognosticators presented their versions of the prospective leading three-year-olds of the forthcoming 1939 season.

In taking into consideration their individual and respective outlooks, it is noteworthy that seldom in the past have any of their early figures and calculations successfully stood the test of competition.

Yet that does not detract one iota from their practiced and experienced judgment, since the ratings of these gentlemen are based solely on the performances of the past and that is the only gauge upon which any intelligent consideration may properly be applied. Their calculations are based purely on the various horses' future prospects as indicated by their past record.

Of the juveniles which raced during 1938, there is complete accord that El Chico was the top-notch, and it was not to be expected that any other youngster would receive the highest rating as the potential three-year-old champion of 1939. The turf sages agreed El Chico should run off with the three-year-old crown of the '39 racing semester.

However, if consistency is to be served, El Chico will not reach that high pinnacle for seldom do the handicappers' scales hold the line. Invariably all the dope is scrambled.

But in drawing up the prospects of all the leading 1939 three-year-old hopefuls, ordinary horse sense and logic points out El Chico as the horse with the most solid promise. Whether the dope later scrambled or not, it is impossible at this time to get away from the Ziegler color bearer. Undeatable in all his previous starts as a juvenile, El Chico rates the top-most call by all odds.

But can he justify that distinction? Can he carry on his sensational winning form to put to rout some other horses which are sure to grow and develop into sturdy challengers by the time the big money events begin to appear on the 1939 racing calendar? Aside from what could be gleaned from the juvenile record, nothing else could be foretold unless you are adept at the art of crystal gazing.

Heart and Courage The burden of proof will lie on El Chico and the point he will mainly have to prove is his ability to run a distance. Therein might lie the key to his entire championship career, for he has never yet had occasion to cast light on that phase of his make-up.

While speed—which El Chico possesses aplenty—is one of the prime requisites for championship stuff, it is endurance and stamina which will come into play in the final analysis. Others among El Chico's competitors have already proven their route-winning ability, notably Challeon, winner of the "Triple Futurities," and unless El Chico can compare favorably in the same respect, he will topple
