

The Eastern Screech Owl is the most common member of its family in Wisconsin and is the only small owl in Wisconwith eartufts. It is much mottled and comes in two color phases, gray and red.

It is a permanent resident in Wisconsin and wherever it is found, making its home from southern Canada south to the uplands of Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, eastern Oklahoma and northern Arkansas.

The "hoo-hoo-hoo" of this owl is a familiar sound and may be heard anywhere as the bird lives in forests, in cities, and about farms.

Its food consists chiefly of mice and large insects but it also takes small animals, fish, lizards, small snakes, etc. It


