

"Teach son, teach father, and have education serve in its fullest capacity," says Milton Bliss, farm radio director of WHA and co-leader of the agricultural student forum.

"When students who are studying the social and economic prob-lems affecting rural life are allowed to broadcast their opinions comments and criticisms of existing agricultural programs, they are learning the art of true thinking and, aiding those persons in the radio audience who want to know more about problems that directly affect farmers and farmng," Bliss explained.

The student forum, presented on alternate Monday afternoons at 1:30 p. m., is the result of a request by a group of University of Wisconsin students who last year voluntarily organized a club for the purpose of discussing rural economic questions with the hope that sincere discussion would aid them in preparing for their life's Critic Present

To make certain that topics would be discussed which would contribute authentic information and expressions, Kenneth H. Parsons, assistant professor in agricultural economics at the university, was chosen to guide the young men in their research on the subjects discussed.

Meetings are held each week to formulate the approach and plan for the radio presentation. Before the broadcast one or two rehear-sals are also held to "polish off the rough spots."
"At each discussion a guest au-

thority is present; he listens carefully to the students' opinions, prepares notes, and then sums up, comments upon, and criticizes on the basis of his experience and more mature judgment." Bliss declared.

He also pointed out that a democratic form of management is fol-lowed to give the students opportunity to gain the most from their efforts. A chairman is chosen for


