Lucas Cut Loose as Pirates Seek Added Strength

PITTSBURGH — (U.P.) — Manager Harold (Pie) Traynor of the Pittsburgh Pirates said he wouldn't break up the team that finished second in the National League last year, but already he has sent away three players in an effort to bolster the club.

The latest to be cut loose was Pitcher Charles Fred (Red) Lu-cas, veteran of 15 years in the National League. Lucas, who broke into organized baseball with Nashville in 1920, was given his unconditional release Monday after the Pirates failed to find another job for him.

Benswanger tied during the maor and minor league meetings to swing a trade but apparently none of the other teams was willing to help strengthen a team that was strong enough to finish second in 1938.

The pitching and catching departments are in need of improvement but Traynor believes that Mueller may be just what is needed to steady his hurlers. Al-though a second string catcher under Al Lopez at Boston, Mueller is a good receiver and it is hoped that his batting will improve since the move from spacious Boston field. The only other catcher on the Pirate squad is Ray Berres, a good receiver and fielder, but weak with a bat.

Should the Pirate's cleaning-out process continue, the next victims probably will be Pitchers Ed Brandt and Joe Bowman. They, with First Baseman Gus Suhr and Outfielder Paul Waner, have been mentioned in many trade rumors. Suhr and Waner have been regulars for many years and have played excellent ball.

Mueller's handlin of pitchers, according to Traynor, should help the Pirate mound staff. Cy Blanton, especailly, is expected to improve and show some of his earlier form. It was rumored last season that Blanton could not pitch effectively to Todd because of his high stance behind the

The Long-eared Owl gets its name from inch-long ear-tufts, largely black in color. This is a medium sized, slender owl with yellow eyes, larger than a Screech Owl and much smaller than a Great Horned Owl, which it resembles in color.

The bird nests throughout the state and is common from early spring until fall. There are fewer Long-eared Owls Wisconsin in winter as they are migratory to some extent.

It nests across the continent from near the tree limit of Canada south to southern California, northern Texas. Arkansas and Virginia. It winters from southern Canada southward to the Gulf states and central Mexico.

The Long-eared Owl feeds mostly on mice and other small animals and although it occasionally takes small birds it is considered generally beneficial. It issues a variety of sounds but on the whole is a more silent member of the

For a nest this owl generally remodels one of a hawk, crow or squirrel. It may be on a cliff and rarely on the ground or in a hollow tree.
