

Who's Who Among Wisconsin Birds



RUBY THROATED HUMMING BIRD

The Ruby-throated Hummingbird is a member of a family of more than 500 species that are found only in the Americas and adjacent islands. The Ruby-throat is the bird found in Wisconsin.

It is the tiniest among Wisconsin birds and is common in all parts of the state. Sometimes it is confused with the hawk-moth because this moth feeds from flowers in the same

This iridescent little bird has been called the gem of the bird world. It serves by help-ing bees and butterflies in cross-fertilization of flowers and consumes great quantities of insects while on its nectar-gathering expeditions.
