BEING STUDIED BY RUSSIANS

Scientists Plan Special Register Of Citizens Over 100 Years Old

Initial Experiments Lead To Belief Chances Are Favorable

MOSCOW-(Correspondence of The Associated Press) - Soviet scientists are drawing up plans for a special register of citizens more than 100 years old with the the causes of longevity.

Recent studies by the institute for clinical physiology of the Ukrainian academy of sciences already have produced interesting results and, according to Prof. I.

3,790 persons out of 1,000,000 in that region claim to be more than 100 years old. This is a phenomenal percentage, compared with most sections of the U.S.S.R., where the number of persons past 100 averages between 110 and 120 per million inhabitants.




