Bradley Barker Is "Person You Didn't Expect To Meet"; Mathematical Genius To Compete With Machine

Bradley Barker, one of radio's great unsung, who for more than a decade has been imitating animals on as many as 15 radio programs a week, will demonstrate his unusual vocal wares as Fred Allen's "Person You Didn't Expect To Meet" Wednesday at 9 p. m. over WEAF.

Barker's name is never heard on the air, but in squeak and roar he has imitated everything from a fly to an elephant. A hungry dinosaur roaming prehistoric plains, an affectionate hippopotamus, a bearded vulture—they're all in the day's work.

Off days Barker spends at the zoo, brushing up on animal sounds. He waits until he gets home to practice, however. One day the actor unthinkingly put on his imitation of a raging lion in the park. Before he was thru he had created a near panic and was found for 24 hours before finding anyone to identify him.

The report includes: marriage licenses totaled 211, including one banau. By months, they were issued as follows: Jan. 13, Feb. 12, Mar. 11, April 23, May 16, June 19, July 18, Aug. 16, Sept. 20 and one banau Oct. 15, Nov. 19 and Dec. 26.

Letters of guardianships embraced the following: guardianships, 20, estates released from guardianships, eight; minors, four, insane, two, incompetent, six; trustees, one, and miscellaneous, one.

Letters of administration included: wills admitted to probate, 74; letters testamentary issued, 39; letters of administration issued, 55; letters of administration and wills annexed, eight; estates less than \$500, no administration, four; and total number of estates administered, 118.

Number of persons sent to the Columbus hospital for the insane: four male and two female, white; and one male colored.

Number of persons sent to the hospital for feeble-minded and epileptic at Orient: two female, white.

Number of persons sent to Boys' Industrial school, two. Number of girls sent to Girls' Industrial school at Powell: in year following 14th birthday, one; in year following 15th birthday, three; in year following 16th birthday, one; and in year following 17th birthday, four.

One man was sent to the Mansfield reformatory.

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Tyrone Power Starred In "Jesse James" At The Quilna

Epic Film Opens At Pre-View Wednesday; Lively Newspaper Yarn Unreel In Fast-Moving Hit At Ohio

A mid-week Quilna preview marks the opening Wednesday night of the great dramatic technicolor version of the life of one of the most famous outlaws in history, "Jesse James." Tyrone Power is cast in the title role, Henry Fonda as his brother, Frank and Nancy Kelly as the wife of the outlaw. Randolph Scott is also seen in an important role.

"Off the Record," a lively newspaper story reuniting those stars of "Back in Circulation," Joan Blondell and Pat O'Brien, is the current Ohio feature. The feature is, however, far removed from the usual run of newspaper pictures because its interest is not limited to the professional exploits of the central characters.

Rivalry between two glamorous movie stars over news publicity brings about uproarious complications in the Sigma's feature, "Annabel Takes a Tour". In the stellar roles are Lucille Ball and Jack Oakie who were seen recently in the first of this "Annabel" series.

Also at the Sigma is "The Storm" an emotional story of adventure and thrills in the lives of wireless operators on American merchant ships. Charles Bickford, Burton MacLane, Preston Foster, Tom Brown and Nan Grey have the leads. Andy Devine and Frank Jenks furnish the comedy.

Opening Wednesday on the State double bill are these two features, "Algiers" and "The Chaser". In the former film, Hedy Lamarr, the much talked of glamour girl, makes her American screen debut co-starring with Charles Boyer.

The second State feature is the unusual story of a lawyer who makes a habit of chasing ambulances, fire trucks and police cars. Dennis O'Keefe and Ann Morris head the cast.

Wednesday is the closing day for "Girl of the Golden West", starring Nelson Eddy and Jeanette MacDonald and "Holiday" co-starring Cary Grant and Katharine Hepburn at the Lyric theatre. Opening Thursday will be "Western Jamboree" and "I Am the Law".

Two years of research into the life and times of this fascinating character before the actual production of the film was begun.

The last previous production in which Pat and Joan were co-stars was also a newspaper picture, "Back in Circulation," but aside from the similarity of background, the new picture has little in common with the former one.

This time Pat and Joan are both persons on the same paper, and considerable excitement is expected to be occasioned by the depiction of their professional exploits, but the fundamental theme of the story—and one that is full of dramatic heart throbs—is the determination of Joan, a warm-hearted and sympathetic woman under her cynical exterior, to accomplish the reform and rehabilitation of a little tough kid.

She encounters the kid first in the course of an expose of juvenile gambling that contributes to the coffers of the city's gambling boss, and after he has been sent to reform school, she contrives to have him paroled to the custody of herself and Pat, to whom she has just been married.

Pat is not at all sympathetic, with her interest in the little tough, but the boy's genuinely good qualities eventually win him over, along the way the youngster apparently reverts to his former criminal habits.
