

Lupe Velez And Horton Set For Comedy Skits Thursday

Lionel Barrymore And Mickey Rooney To Do Dramatic Sketch On Good News Broadcast

Lupe Velez, the cinema's bruntiest bombshell, and Edward Everett Horton, one of the screen's foremost funnymen, will team up in two amiably insane comedy skits when they appear as Walter O'Keefe's guests on "Turn-Up Time," Thursday at 10 to 10:45 p. m. over WABC.

The vivacious brilliance of Miss Velez and Horton's awkward diffidence will be contrasted to the utmost when they play the roles of a long-lost aunt and uncle in O'Keefe's serial story of the "McGonigle Family." O'Keefe will also present the Hollywood pair in a comedy extravaganza entitled "The Romance of Lupe Velez and Edward Everett Horton."

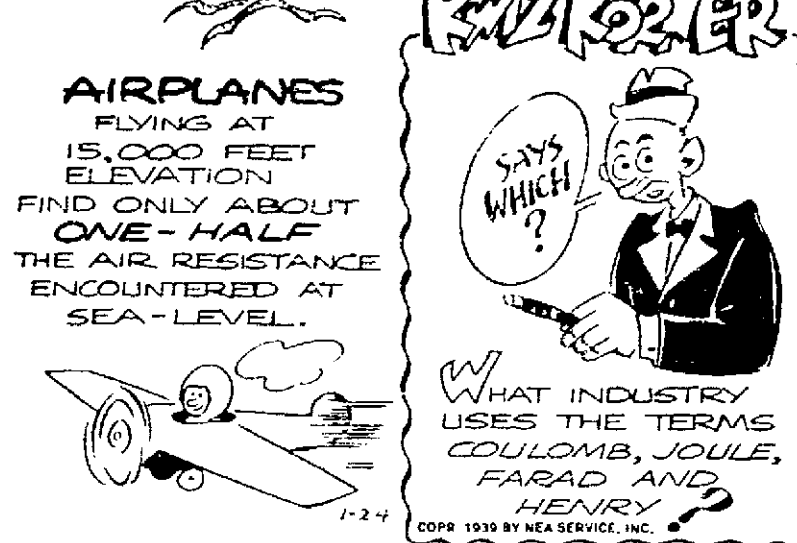

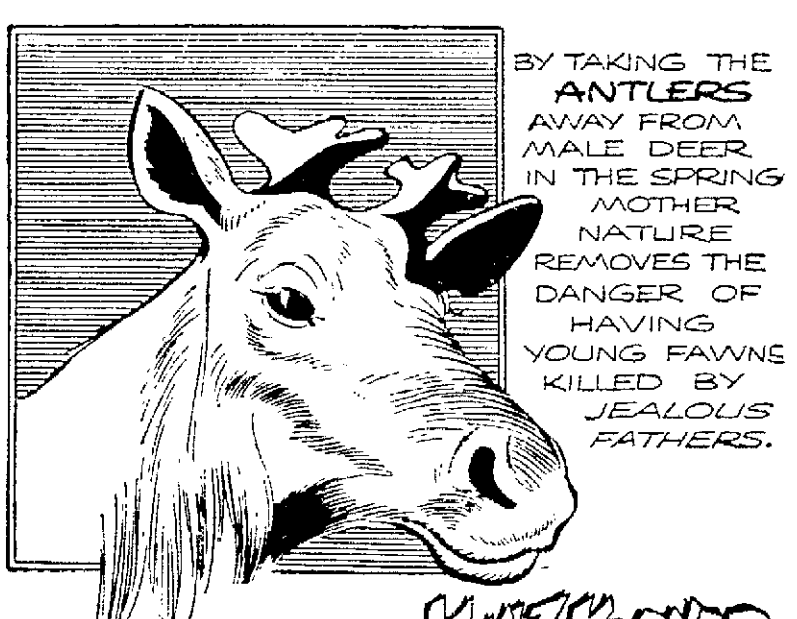

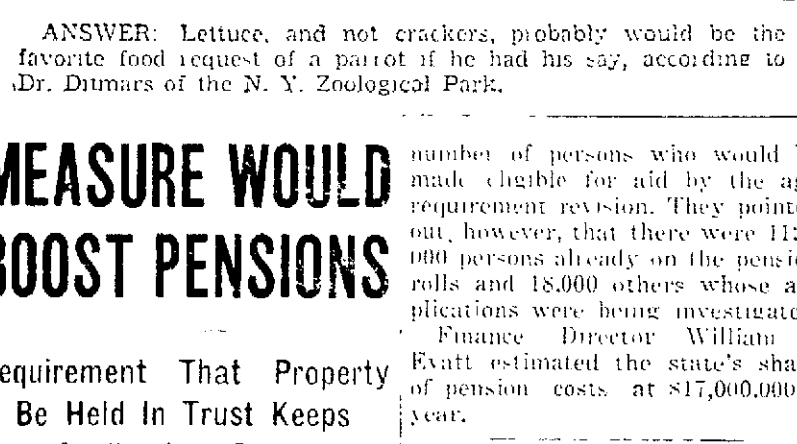
ONE FULL-GROWN WING FEATHER OF A BIRD MAY CONTAIN MORE THAN A MILLION PARTS.

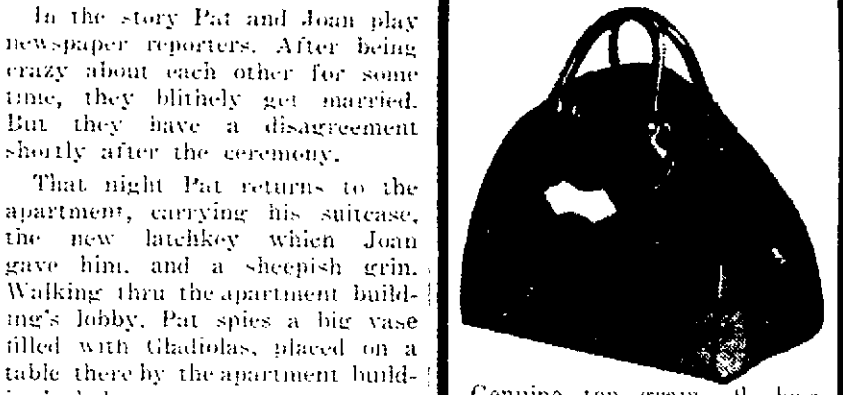
POLICE GIVE WARNINGS TO LONDON JAYWALKERS

MEASURE WOULD BOOST PENSIONS

Requirement That Property Be Held In Trust Keeps Applications Down

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 26—(AP) — If the Ohio legislature should abolish the requirement that old age pension recipients transfer their property to the state in trust, applications for old age benefits would increase nearly 10,000 within a few days, welfare department officials estimated today.

The provision for the state relinquishing claim to the real estate and personal property of old age pensioners was included in a bill introduced in the Ohio house of representatives last week by Rep. W. H. Whetton (D-Lawrence) and Rep. John C. Carney (D-Cuyahoga).

Wray Bevens, chief of the division of aid for the aged, declared that between 8,000 and 10,000 persons who were eligible to apply for old age assistance under present Ohio law had not done so because of the requirement that the state hold their property in trust until death.

Bevens said the state derived approximately \$400,000 during 1938 from estates of old age pensioners as reimbursement for assistance. Other provisions of the age pension bill would increase the minimum pension from \$30 to \$40 per month and lower the age requirement from 65 to 60.
