NEW YORK—(U,P)—Joe Louis rising young millionaire from Detroit, counted his dollars today and announced he had embarked upon a new business policy-"Knock 'em out quick in the first round."

In pursuit of that policy he made a bleeding, helpless hulk out of one of the best of the boxers Wednesday night in two minutes and 29 seconds of what was scheduled to be a 15-round bout in Madison Square Garden.



## Who's Who Among Wisconsin Birds



Yellow-bellied Sapsucker is one of Wisconsin's interesting birds although it has won a bad reputation for the damage it does

This bird lives largely on the sap of trees and inner bark that it obtains by tapping many encircling holes around the trunk. The bird visits the holes it has made at frequent intervals, drinking the sap that accumulates. It also eats insects that come to feast on the flowing sap.

Red squirrels as well as Humbird Birds join the insects in using the sap wells that the Sapsuckers have made for their own use. Bird students find that these tapped trees are the best places to study the Humming
