Recently a move was made to have the Big Ten Conference lift its ban on post-season contests so the champions of the two conferences could clash in the annual classic at Pasadena. The faculty committee of the conference, however, "reaffirmed" the Big Ten policy, barring such a possibility.

Yost, who is in Nashville on an annual visit with relative, declared Yost's coach and director I know in the Big Ten is perfectly satisfied with the policy.

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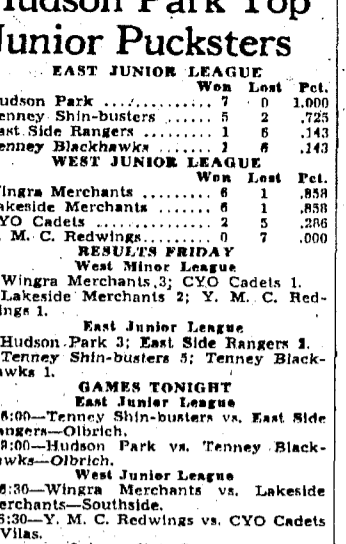
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Who's Who Among Wisconsin Birds



KINGBIRD

The Eastern Kingbird is an abundant Wisconsin summer resident, nesting throughout the state and is everywhere from early May until September, often seen on post or wire.

This bird lives up to its name. It is pugnacious and will attack anything, even hawks and owls, and more than holds its own in spite of its small size. On the other hand, other birds are found nesting near it, apparently undisturbed.

The Kingbird's big value to man is shown by the fact that 89 per cent of its diet consists of animal matter, mainly harmless beetles, weevils, grasshoppers, crickets, robberflies, wasps, caterpillars, etc. It also eats some berries and wild grasses.

Its nesting range is southern Canada south through central Nevada to northern Mexico in the west and to the Gulf states in the east. It winters from southern Mexico to Bolivia.

The bird is dark gray or slate above, white below with a tail conspicuously tipped with white.

The nest is usually on a horizontal limb of a tree, four to 25 or more feet up, but it may be in bushes close to the ground, on fence posts, stumps, bridge girders, etc. The nest is bulky and firm of weed stems, coarse grasses, twine, etc., lined with finer grasses, hair and rootlets. In the north wood moss and lichens are used.

Match Is Sought Between Galento and Schmeling

PHILADELPHIA — (UP)—Herman Taylor, Philadelphia boxing promoter, today sought to match Tony Galento, Orange, N. J., tavern keeper, and Max Schmeling, former heavyweight champion, for a June clash at Municipal Stadium here, providing Galento was not drafted for a Joe Louis fight.

Taylor conferred with Mike Jacobs, Madison Square Garden fight impresario, at New York Friday and reportedly demanded that the Louis-Galento match be held in Philadelphia on a co-promotional basis, similar to that between Jacobs and Taylor for the Louis-Al Etorge fight here.

It was understood that Jacobs declined to use the barrel-like Galento in a championship bout unless he could control both his destinies thereafter.

"I told Jacobs that the Galento contract is not for sale," said Taylor.

Miss Coleman Hopes for Job in Olympics

NEW YORK — (INS)—Georgia Coleman, who won the fancy springboard diving crown for the United States back in the 1932 Olympics, today is looking forward to acting as a judge of diving at the 1940 Olympics in Finland.

"I've been away from swimming competition for a number of years," she said, at a hotel where she has a job as swimming instructor, "but I follow it very closely."

Georgia turned pro and gave exhibitions for a time, then played tournament golf from 1934 to 1937. She was ill for several months, but by dieting. She developed boils having weakened her resistance in her ear, caught a cold and got pneumonia which turned into paralysis.
