Mayor Of North Hollywood Has A Chance To Learn What Constituents Think Of Her Administration

Glenda Farrell, screen actress and Mayor of North Hollywood, will make a guest appearance on the show starring Bob Hope, Tuesday at 10:00 p. m. over WEAF.

Miss Farrell's visit will give her a chance to learn what her constituents think as Hope is a resident of North Hollywood and Jerry Colonna, the mad professor, also has his home in Miss Farrell's bailiwick.

Patricia Wilder (Honeychile) and Skinnay Ennis will uphold the honor of the South against the attacks of three Californians. In addition to a heckling match between the Mayor and her citizens, Hope's half hour program will feature a song sketch, with Colonna, Bill Goodwin, Skinnay Ennis and the Six Hits and a Miss. Ennis' orchestra will provide the musical background and Skinnay's baritone will be heard in vocal selections.

Despite their move to the sunnier clime of California, Fibber McGee and company will invoke the prerogatives of radio and continue to pursue their eventful lives in Wistful Vista during their broadcast over WEAF Tuesday at 9:30 p. m. Aberted by Horatio K. Boomer, The Old Times, Nick DePopulus, Mrs. Uppington, Hal Pearl and other Wistful Vista citizenry, Fibber will get into as much hot water as usual. Donald Novis will sing, "Only A Rose," the Four Notes will swing "Sing For Your Supper," and Billy Mills' orchestra will play musically "Great Day" and "Zing Went the Strings of My Heart."

Jack Teagarden, one of the noblest Romans of swing, joins Benny Goodman's band for the Swing Session of Tuesday at 9:30 p. m. on WABC. Mr. Jackson T., as Teagarden is known among the hot musicians, will ride to glory on "Basin Street Blues," a vehicle he made famous with his trombone. Mr. Jackson T. is a recent graduate from the Paul Whiteman band. His appearance on the Goodman broadcast is a commencement day exercise. Next week he begins a career as an orchestra leader.

Teagarden's tromboning is said to be of such tremendous power that it takes two men to hold his instrument for him. He has been known to blow excruciating top notes thru his fingers when the trombone couldn't take it any more. John Mercer, some-what of a teagardening master of ceremonies, will join Teagarden in "Dr. Heckle and Mr. Jive," "Fialich in Swing," written by Ziggy Elman, the Goodman cornetist, will be presented in a new version, with zingy-chanteuse Martha Tilton doing the vocal. The top of the program will blow off with "Begin the Beguine," a number Goodman has repeatedly refused to do until he found the perfect arrangement. He believes he has it now.

Johnny Green and his orchestra will take over the musical assignments on the Johnny Presents program, succeeding Russ Morgan's orchestra, beginning Tuesday, at 8 p. m. over WEAF. Green, composer, pianist and band leader, is a veteran in radio, and has been featured with many NBC headliners including the Jack Benny and Packard programs. Among his well known song hits are "Out of Nowhere," "Body and Soul,"

"I Cover the Waterfront" and "I've Got a Heavy Date." Jack Johnston's dramatic episodes will continue as a feature of the program.

Elizabeth Hawes, style authority, and Gilbert Seldes, journalist, author and playwright, will be guest experts on the Information Please program over WJZ Tuesday, at 8:30 p. m. With them, answering the questions put by Clifton Fadiman, will be John Kieran and Franklin P. Adams, regular members of the board.

Miss Hawes has been style consultant to many New York institutions including Bergdorf-Goodman, Lord & Taylor, R. H. Macy & Co., Vogue, The New Yorkers and Madame Croul. Her recent book, "Fashion Is Spinach," debunking certain fashions of fashion, will have a sequel in "Are You Comfortable in That?" It will deal with men's clothes.

Seldes' writing includes fiction, non-fiction, plays, movies, magazine articles, newspaper columns, music criticism and war correspondence. He is a graduate of Harvard.

COLLIERIES, Mo., Jan. 31 - (UP) - The modern college girl, unlike her mother, has a difficult time when it comes to gossiping, according to a survey conducted at Stephens College for Women.

The survey, conducted by more than 350 freshmen students, revealed that most college girls have speech defects or are backward when it comes to talking. As a result, "gab fests" have been organized at the college dormitories to help the girls improve their speech.

The survey, conducted by Dr. Wesley A. Wiksill, professor of speech, showed that nearly 40 per cent of the girls suffered from noticeable speech defects.

Almost an equal number showed a lack of confidence and a tendency to be "stuffy" when they were called upon to express themselves. Only six per cent of the girls were able to talk freely, without hesitation, and were without speech defects.

Tuesday is the closing day for the weird monster picture, "The Son of Frankenstein" starring Boris Karloff, Basil Rathbone, Bela Lugosi, Lionel Atwill and Josephine Hutchinson.

Continuing at the Ohio is "Idiot's Delight," an unusual story of two persons brought together by the events following a war. Clark Gable is seen in a new type role as is Norma Shearer, his leading lady. Edward Arnold and Burgess Meredith, famous stage actor, are in principal supporting roles.

One of the most colorful law breakers in the history of America is made the hero of the film, "Jesse James" which stars Tyrone Power in the title role and which is still showing on the screen of the Quilna. Nancy Kelly a newcomer to filmland and Henry Fonda and Randolph Scott complete the stellar cast.

Opening Tuesday on the Lyric's double bill are these two features, "You Can't Take It With You" starring Lionel Barrymore, Jean Arthur, James Stewart, Edward Arnold, and Spring Byington and "He Loved an Actress" starring Ben Lyon, Lupe Velez and Wallace Ford.
