Spring Has Arrived to MacPhail

NEW YORK -(INS) - Peering from behind a snowbank, with icicles clinging to his ears, Business Manager Larry McPhail of the Brooklyn Dodgers announced today that insofar as he is concerned spring is here. Briefly Third Baseman Cookie Lavagetto and Outfielder Tuck Stainback are scheduled to begin conditioning at Hot Springs, Ark., Thursday, bringing about a slightly premature, but more or less official opening of the baseball training

With his new manager "Lippy Leo" Durocher, at his side, Mac Phail also revealed that the Dodgers—or he personally—will inject still another innovation into baseball this year. When the pitchers and catchers report at Hot Springs on Feb. 15, They will be accompanied by Artie McGovern, who in 10 years took an estimated ton of suet off Babe Ruth.

He'll Have 'Em Ready That, however, was a solo job that McGovern did on the Babe's chassis. Now the former will tac-kle a whole team, making it prob-

ably the first time in baseball history that a nationally famous physical instructor and dietician has been engaged to put a ball club in shape.

"I'm going to get those Dodgers ready to fight, wrestle, run, or play baseball, and if the experiment goes all right I may work with the club indefinitely," Mc-Govern said. Durocher thinks the hiring of

McGovern is one of the greatest things MacPhail ever thought of, and among the things MacPhail has thought of was the appointment of Durocher as manager.

"This may not seem important at first glance," Durocher said "but if it works the way I think it will we will have the best conditioned ball club in the major leagues when we take the field for the opening game. That and the fact that we have a hundred per cent better ball club than we had last year makes me confident that we are about to go places in my first attempt at running a team."
