# RFC Head Predicts 1939 Prosperity

WASHINGTON -(U.P)- Chairman Jesse H. Jones of the Reconstruction Finance corporation pre-dicted Saturday night that business this year may equal levels of 1937 when the peak of the recovery movement was reached.

If 1937 levels are attained this year, a national income of approximately \$70,000,000,000 is in prospect. In 1937, national income exceeded \$69,000,000,000, and preliminary indications are that in 1938 it dropped to approximately \$62,500,000,000.

John W. Hanes, under-secretary of the treasury, has said repeatedly that if national income can be raised to at least \$75,000,000,-000, the federal government could balance the budget on the basis of current spending. Jones is regarded as one of the

# Heil Pledges HighwayDept. 'Clean Up'

LA CROSSE - Criticism of the Wisconsin highway commission for having too many "chairwarmers" was voiced emphatically here Friday night by Gov. Heil as he assured the convention of Wisconsin Constructors, Inc., that he will "clean house" to bring economy in state government.

"I find in the highway department some 890 people either warming chairs or making blueprints," the governor asserted. "During budget hearings I discovered from executives in the department that there is one boss for every two men. "How would you run your in-

dustry with such an organiza-tion?" he asked. "There are junior bookkeepers, junior clerks, eight kinds of draftsmen, and many others." During the budget hearings in Madison referred to by the gover-

nor, he said he knew from a private survey he paid for himself that there were one boss for every two employes in the commission. He has frequently stressed his promise to "clean house" and strive for strict economy.

"Some papers say I am vicious

and am taking bread from the mouths of citizens," Gov. Heil asserted. "If you were in my place and had a man working for \$175 a month doing nothing and could push him on relief for \$60 a month and save money, what would you

"You cannot let your heart interfere with your acts. As sure as I am here tonight, just that sure, if the good Lord lets me live and the legislature gives me an opportunity, I am going to clean house." Urging business to employ more labor, he pointed out he would not

interfere with legitimate business. He expressed approval of setting aside certain gasoline tax and license funds for highway con-struction annually "so you know every year how much is available.

Gov. Heil said, "I resent that my predecessors have been diverting funds from one account to another for convenience."

The convention unaniriously adopted a resolution protesting against day labor on city, state and federal projects, and demanded amendment of the Wagner labor relations act to take away judicial powers of the national la-bor relations board.

# Conservation Group Maps Program

A six-point program designed to make Wisconsin an even better here late Saturday by the Wisconsin Conservation congress executive council, representing the state's 71 counties.

The program envisages public hunting grounds throughout the state, a new fishing license law to provide for an expanded fish propagation schedule, and other proposals to forward what the council believes is a wise conservation

policy. The council, after meeting in the Hotel Loraine since morning, decided not only to work for support in the legislature but to show

the public their plans.

General Fishing License In summary, the congress' legis-

ative program is:

ONE—Establishment of hunting and fishing grounds to be acquired by the conservation commis-sion for public use by all persons

complying with regulations.

TWO—General fishing license for all persons over the age of 18 and under the age of 65. The fee of \$1 would be used to produce more fish and carry on the removal of rough fish from the

state's waters.

THREE—Christmas tree regu-THREE—Christmas tree regulation. This bill provides that every tree sold within the state shall bear a tag, for which the fee shall be five cents.

conservationists and sportsmen as "the sounding board of public opinion." Its delegates are elected by "town hall meetings" and these delegates in turn elect the executive council members. The congress holds frequent public conservation measures and opposes or supports the conservation commission as it sees fit, its officials explained. Dr. J. A. Riegel, St. Croix Falls,

one executive member, said the public hunting grounds "would be a great boon to farmers and hunters alike." It would provide hunting places for southern Wisconsin hunters, he said, who now have practically no good hunting grounds or but little space in their territory.

H. W. MacKenzie, state conser-

vation director, attended afternoon sessions of the meeting. He said that Wisconsin should raise two billion fish and plant them, as well as remove rough fish such as carp. Promises Benefits To accomplish this ambitious program, he explained, much

money will be needed. "This year the legislature is conomy minded," he pointed out, "and we didn't ask a cent for rough

fish removal."

He added that if the congress' fish bill becomes a law, the license money will go to carry or the fish production and removal program, with fishermen getting "exactly what they pay for."


