DIES INVESTIGATION NEEDED, SAYS OHIOAN, RAPPING APPOINTMENTS

By KENNETH E. SANDERS WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Rep. Routhon (R-Ohio) was in "hearty accord" with continuation of the Dies committee investigation into non-American activities, because, he said, the nature of appointments to high places under the New Deal has "encouraged radicalism."

He assented the committee so far "had a tendency to throw the fear of God into radicals, if they have such a fear, and especially those who have been permitting radicals to deal with them."

"Another tendency," said the Dayton Republican, "is certainly to retard some activities of the radical element."

"If the investigation won't do anything else, it will arouse the American people to the lurking danger of radicalism."

The United States, he continued, has nothing to fear from Germany, Italy, Japan or other nations, but from those "boring inside."

Representative Seeger (D-Ohio) announced he would seek an appropriation of the full \$4,500,000 already authorized for the Muskingum valley conservancy district instead of the \$2,000,000 which army engineers suggested might well be used in the next fiscal year starting June 30.

The money would be used to reimburse the conservancy district for money expended for land. In turn, the district would reimburse property owners.

Representative Bender (R-Ohio) was one of the members of the house rivers and harbors committee who made a trip to Florida to inspect the proposed Florida ship canal. Bender said he believed the project was "hokum," but that as a member of the committee it was only fair to obtain first-hand information. He emphasized that expenses of the trip were being paid in Florida, and not by the federal government.

Representative Kurwan (D-Ohio) was another making the trip. He also is a member of the rivers and harbors committee.

Informed persons predicted that the proposed floodwall at Portsmouth, O., would not be affected by budgetary cuts in army engineering appropriations for flood control. The engineers said \$185,000,000 could probably be expended on flood control in the next

Thus it was that Virginia's racing pen put down such cryptic whimsicalities as: "See, 27c. Bobby enters scratching nose. Leo spins over left shoulder as says line Halop runs fingers right hand thru hair on reply Bernard scratching right leg thru action in background Huntz trying catch fly at window Gabriel uses left hand to thumb nose at John Garfield two buttons Garfield's shirt open at throat Leo spins over right shoulder after his second line Billy sticks out right foot to trip Huntz Hall who bumps into Bernard who falls against table upsetting lamp which falls to right at end scene."

NO JOB PROVES BOON TO FAMILY

Father's Unemployment Brings Thriving Industry, Profitable To All

OLMSTEAD FALLS, O., Feb. 6.—(UPI)—Father's unemployment was fortunate, instead of a drawback, for the William Crowley family—they now have a thriving home industry which is profitable for all.

Crowley, temporarily without a job, decided to spend his time to some advantage and began experimenting with creating plaster figures. His studio was the family garage and his chief assistant, daughter Evelyn, who was contracting from pneumonia. Fifteen-year-old Evelyn sketched the Crowley dog and other animals and her father followed the sketches in making his figurines.

LABOR IS DIVIDED Then the rest of the family joined forces.

"Here is the division of labor," Crowley explained.

"Evelyn makes the preliminary sketch, I do the plaster carving and molding, 15-year-old William, Jr., is responsible for the casting, aided by Charles, who is 11, and Mrs. Crowley paints the figures. Eight-year-old Bob takes care of the jars and brushes. Our three dogs and three cats pose as models."

He said that the family has perfected a durable composition for statues and a washable finish, but that the formulas for both these processes are secrets.

"In less than a year in business we have sold more than 2,000 novelty art objects to shops in Cleveland, and other surrounding cities including Berea, Fairview, Ashabuta, and Elyria. We also have sold some objects to Buffalo Stores," Crowley said.

"The objects range from statues of Washington and Lincoln to comic cowboy figures.

"As for our factory, it has expanded until it now includes the garage, furnace room and the summer kitchen."

He added that he is employed again but that he spends all his spare time working at home.

"Give up the business because I have a job again? No, I wouldn't think of doing that," Crowley said.
