No Longer is Max Schmeling Important in Boxing Picture

By DAN PARKER NEW YORK — News dispatches from Germany state that the government is going to tighten up its regulations against taking money out of the country. About the time this news was breaking, Max Schmeling, just in from Der Fuehrer's domain, was announcing to New York sports writers his willingness to earn more American money to bring back to Germany.

Max, here on a "good will tour" to see relatives and friends, made it clear that he wants to fight again, particularly Joe Louis. To prove his right to this rubber with the champion whom he knocked out in their first meeting, Max said he was willing to fight any of the contenders. The fact that Promoter Mike Jacobs and his aide-de-camp, Ed Frayne, were among his first official callers, indicates that Max isn't the only one who has ideas along those lines.

Max is a fine, clean athlete and even the most violent anti-Nazis admire and respect him. But the fact that he comes from a land which denies to boxers of other nations the right to take money earned in Germany out of the country, should make him subject to the same treatment here, because it's a poor rule that doesn't work both ways.

Through as a Fighter Aside from this purely political view of Max's future plans, there is also to be considered the fact that his last fight with Louis and the one with Ben Foord in Germany a short time previously, proved rather convincingly that as an important figure in the heavyweight picture, Schmeling no longer exists. Nothing, except more dollars for Schmeling and the promoters is to be gained by matching him with any of the contenders, much less Louis himself.

Schmeling said he'd meet Nova "with pleasure." Such a bout would test Nova, though a match with Max's stablemate, Tony Galento, which Nova has already declined, would serve the same purpose besides keeping the money in America.

There is no sense in holding another Baer-Schmeling fight, and no reason for a Schmeling-Galento match. Chucking Barlund or Farr at Schmeling might help him but for what? Another two-minute butchering at the hands of Louis? Even the most violent anti-Nazis wouldn't relish seeing that again.

One Conviction Enough As might be expected, Schmeling doesn't seem convinced yet that Louis is his master. The last one to admit it when a fighter is through is the fighter himself. Max prefers to remember the first Louis bout, not the second, and you can't blame him for that. You can blame him, though, for expecting Americans to pay \$25 to see Joe Louis convince him about something on which he convinced them last June, at 25 bouts per conviction.

Promoter Jacobs, desperate for a summer bout for Louis, doesn't need much encouraging to fall in line with Schmeling's plans. Because Max is a ready-built contender, he is preferable to Nova, the novice, and Baer, who quit to Louis. You can't blame him for that. He takes precedence over Schmeling if for no other reason than that he is an unknown quantity and that Jacobs doesn't seem anxious to give him the shot.

Tony, for all his crudeness of style, is a menace on the score of his left hook alone. It is a dangerous hook, and any man who has a punch and heart to back it up is a threat to Louis' title. Schmeling, on the other hand, is as safe an opponent as John Henry Lewis, and for that reason would appeal to Promoter Jacobs who naturally enough doesn't want to have his gold mine blow up.

Max's arrival here on the Normandie, a French liner, instead of on the Bremen, the big German ship pulled into port a few hours later, looked like a sop to the anti-Nazi fight trade, though Max himself went to some pains

Tiger Fox's KO Doubly Amazing Because It Was by a Southpaw

By JACK CUDDY NEW YORK—(U.P.)—After what happened at Madison Square Garden Friday night, I pause to inquire: "What about the late Arthur Brisbane's gorilla?"

I ask this because the one and only Tiger Jack Fox suffered a technical knockout in the ninth round. And to make matters worse, he was belted out by a southpaw, Melio Bettina.

Nothing worse could happen to anyone in the fight business than to lose a "title" scrap to a southpaw. It's almost as bad as if a stage and screen star had children who were acrobats.

I'm not saying that a southpaw boxer can't win fights. They can, to a certain extent. But they're not supposed to go places in the heavier divisions. In fact I believe that Signor Bettina of Beacon, N. Y., is the first portside ever to hold even a portion of a crown above the middleweight division.

It is doubly amazing to find a southpaw winning a title against a gorilla. And that's what I've always called Tiger Jack Fox, the somewhat antiquated Negro from Spokane, Wash.

Never have I seen anyone in the ring who resembled Ringling's "gargantua" more than Mistah Fox, with his long arms, low-hanging fists and primitive snarl. But a southpaw to beat him for the lightweight championship of the world (or at least that portion of the world that is bounded by New York state's lines and Chairman John J. Phelan's pronouncements.)

The sports writers of lammers' lane and the smart money boys agreed with the late Mr. Brisbane. They made Fox a top-heavy favorite over Southpaw Bettina. I imagine some of them wagged five and six to one, when they learned that the southpaw from Beacon was managed by a semi-pro magician, Jimmy Grippo. They could not conjecture a goffer combination from a lefty larper who had a pilot from the land of legerdemain.

... warn't no safety razor... Bettina started the gorilla man back to his Spokane jungles when he floored Fox for a count in the eighth round. And it seems that the bruiser from Beacon had command of the fight all the way, up to this trip to the canvas.

Despite the gorilla man's uncertainty, I still can't believe that he was beaten by a southpaw. Particularly by a southpaw managed by a magician. My investigation reveals that Tiger Fox probably lost this fight—and the New York portion of the crown—when he was outpointed in his last scrap prior to Friday night's title engagement.
