In a Nutshell

WHO? Every single person or married person not living with husband or wife who had net income of \$3,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more and generally, husband and wife living together, who had an aggregate net income of \$5,000 or more or an aggregate gross income of \$5,000 or more, must file returns. If in doubt, obtain form and printed instructions from collector of internal revenue.

WHEN? The filling period begins January 1 and ends March 15, 1939.

WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.

EOW? See instructions accompanying Forms 1040 A and 1040.

WHAT? Four percent normal tax on the amount of net income in excess of the personal exemption, credit for dependents, earned-income credit, and interest on obligations of the United States and obligations of instrument-silities of the United States.
