Twenty-hour duty in hospitals was eliminated as of Jan. 1, and the only private duty hour change is in 20-hour duty. The pay schedule includes \$5 a day and three meals for the divided eight-hour day; \$4 a day and two meals for the straight eight-hour day; and \$57 a day and three meals for the 12-hour day or night.

An additional charge of \$1 a day is made for eight and 12-hour duty on contagious diseases and alcoholic and mental cases, as well as obstetrical cases including care of the baby.
