

New Radio Character To Make Debut With Jack Haley

Old Ranger To Review Historical Incidents In Grass Valley: Pre-view Of California World's Fair Is Scheduled

Lucille Ball will introduce a new character to the radio when she portrays the part of Jack Haley's tough, sassy little niece—a sort of "Dead End Girl"—on the show, Friday at 7:30 p. m. over WABC.

The setting for the broadcast will be a railroad station, where Haley joins his empire troupe, including Virginia Verrell and Ted Fio-Rito's orchestra, in welcoming the newcomer and her tutor, "could be" Artie Auerbach.

A dramatic bombshell will be exploded as Haley's niece, in "The Story of King Arthur and His Golden Knight," with Virginia Verrell, who has mysteriously reappeared from a "radio automobile accident," will sing "Have a Heart" and Ted Fio-Rito will play "I'm Gonna Be a Sailor" and "Some Rainy Day."

The star of "Three Men On A Horse" will bring one of two men at a mile when Sam Levene, stage and screen celebrity, co-stars with Orson Welles on the "Campbell Playhouse" Friday, at 9:00 p. m. over WABC.

Levene and Welles will do a special radio version of "Burlesque," the George Walworth Arthur Hopkins stage hit which starred the late Hal Skelly. Welles will play the role of "Skid," originally made famous by Skelly, and Levene will play the part of Skid's stage manager pal.

A series of historical anecdotes concerning the famous mining region of Grass Valley will be told by the Old Ranger during the drama, "Gold Hill," to be heard on the Death Valley Days program Friday, over WEAF from 9:30 to 10:00 p. m. Stories of the discovery of Grass Valley and of the abundance of gold found there will be dramatized. Twelve mines in the village of Grass Valley are still in operation today, producing large quantities of the precious metal.

A "radio-eye" view of the San Francisco World's Fair—from the air and from vantage points on the ground—will be heard Friday, one day before the Fair is opened officially with an address by President Roosevelt, also to be broadcast by NBC.

The radio voyage thru the Fair grounds will be heard Friday from 7 to 7:30 p. m. over WJZ. President Roosevelt's address opening the Fair the following day will be delivered from the White House and will be broadcast from 3 to 4 p. m. over WJZ.

Rudyard Kipling Story Is Basis For New Ohio Picture

Double Bills Will Feature Friday Evening Programs Offered In Lima Show Houses

The vivid screen version of Rudyard Kipling's poem "Gunga Din," with all its struggle and adventure, is scheduled to open at the Ohio Saturday. Heading the brilliant cast are such film notables as Cary Grant, Victor McLaglen, Douglas Fairbanks Jr. and Joan Fontaine.

Starting at the Quilna preview Friday night will be an exciting double feature bill. The first production stars Jackie Cooper in a story of young high school students, the title of which is "Gangster's Boy." The second hit is "Rebellious Daughters," featuring Marjorie Reynolds, Vera Hills and Sheila Bromley.

A sequel to the gay romantic mystery comedy, "Fast Company," is due to open at the Sigma theatre Saturday co-starring Robert Montgomery and Rosalind Russell. This latest addition to the adventures of a book dealer in his hobby of detection is titled "Fast and Loose."

Their subsequent adventures and hair-breadth escapes from sudden death merge into a whirlwind of action.

"Gunga Din" was produced and directed by George Stevens. In the cast are such favorite screen players as Cary Grant, Victor McLaglen, Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., Joan Fontaine, Sam Jaffe, Eduardo Ciannelli, Montagu Love, Robert Coote and Abner Biberman.

Something new under the sun is revealed at the Sigma theatre where Robert Montgomery and Rosalind Russell will race across the screen in "Fast and Loose," a rip-roaring sequel to last year's comedy hit, "Fast Company." The new picture is a most unusual mystery comedy that contains all the qualities of first-rate entertainment.

"Fast and Loose" unwinds in rapid-fire manner from the novel motive of baffling crimes acted

by the desire of many persons to gain possession of a rare and valuable document, or at least to prevent Montgomery and his work- and guests, to the Torment estate. While there, Reginald Owen, another guest, is mysteriously slugged and Montgomery proves that the rare book still in the cracked safe, is a forgery.

Before Montgomery solves the multi-mystery that revolves around the disappearance of the rare book and the substitution of a faked copy, Miss Russell is held captive by gangster and rescued by her husband. Together they face death in a faked auto collision and three mysterious murders are committed.
