gasoline shows that the tax is imposed on the consumer and not on the dealer, the consumer may deduct as a tax, for federal incometax purposes, the amount of the gasoline tax paid by him; but the taxpayer must have kept records of the payment of such taxes in order that the deduction may be substantiated as is requried by the law and the regulations. The federal gasoline tax is not deductible by the consumer. A taxpayer may ascertain whether the gasoline tax imposed by a state is deductible by the consumer or by the dealer by addressing an inquiry to the collector of internal revenue for his district.

In any case where the gasoline purchased is used for business purposes, the tax may be added to the cost of the gasoline and deducted as a business expense; but


