EMBASSY STONED

Warsaw Students Resume Anti-German Demonstrations

WARSAW, Poland, Feb. 25-(UP)-More than 1000 students broke thru a police cordon today and stoned the German embassy, smashing all ground floor windows.

The outbreak coincided with arrival of Count Galeazzo Ciano, LARD-March foreign minister of Italy, Germany's partner in the Rome-Beilin axis, and with anti-German dem-O onstrating by students at all principal Polish universities.

BUDAPEST, Feb. 25—(INS)— More "Hungarists" were taken into custody as Premier Count Paul Teleky continued his campaign, already legalized by a decice of suppression, to blot out Hungary's major pro-Nazi party. With arrests believed to be well over the 500 mark, and with not one green necktie-the Nazi "uniform"-to be seen, minor raids on Hungarist headquarters went on. and ring-leaders were dispatched

to concentration camps

RENSSELAER, Ind., Feb. 25-(AP)-Ralph Myers, 45-year-old IN World war veteran, stood acquitted today on a charge he plotted to kill his wealthy, 73-year-old father, George, for \$700 last December.

A jury of 11 farmers and a housewife deliberated only four and a half hours last night before! freeing Myers of a charge of conspinacy to commit a felony

State Policemen Fremont Lemler and James Bartell testified they had posed as "gangsters from Peoria, Ill" to trap Myers the night of Dec. 8. They said they had been "tipped" that Myers wanted his father done away with and was willing to pay for it.

Lemler and Bartell said they and other officers caught Myers in the act of handing over a \$700 "payoff check."

Myers and his father had been estranged. The father, reported to be worth more than \$100,000, died of heart disease Jan. 18, in Bradenton, Fla.
