By JACK CUDDY (Copyright 1939, by United Press) NEW YORK-(U.P.) - Comeback chances of the St. Louis Cardinals this season will depend consider-ably upon the success or failure of three highly touted rookie pitch-ers: Ken Raffensberger, Tom Sunkel, and Mort Cooper. The Cards have 16 flingers list-

ed on their roster, but only Curt Davis, Lon Warneke, and ancient Bob Weiland bear any resemblance to starting rotators.

Pathetic pitching was the major fault in the Cards' weak defense last year—a wishy-washy defense that caused the Red Birds to slump down to sixth place. The defensive weakness of St. Louis in 1938 can be appreciated fully only with the understanding that the Cards had the strongest offense in the National League. They led in club batting with .2739.
