

STOCK PRICES RESUME CLIMB

Fractional Gains Recorded At Active Opening On Wall Street

LIMA STOCKS Westinghouse Elec. & Mfg. open, 114 5/8; high, 114 3/4; low, 114 1/4; close, 114 3/4.

NEW YORK, March 4 (AP)—Leading stocks resumed the upward tilt in today's early market proceedings.

At an active opening fractional gains included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, N. Y. Central, Pennsylvania, Westinghouse, Douglas Aircraft, Anconada, Youngstown Sheet and U. S. Rubber.

Those watching building material stocks noted forecasts in trade circles that more than the usual seasonal expansion of 50 per cent in the volume of residential construction between the first and second quarters of the year might be realized in coming months.

Not so cheering was the federal reserve summary of department store sales for the week ended Feb. 25, showing a drop of 5 per cent from the comparable week last year.

Trade To Be Sought Dr. Schacht Assigned By Hitler To Head Campaign

BERLIN, March 4 (UP)—Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, the financial "wizard" recently ousted as head of the Reichsbank, was reported in reliable quarters today to have been instructed by Adolf Hitler to take command of a great campaign to revive foreign trade.

Coincidentally with this report, Field Marshal Hermann Goering, Hitler's right hand man, went to Italy for a visit of several weeks during which he was expected to hold important conferences with Premier Benito Mussolini and other Italian leaders.

Goering was expected particularly to discuss Italy's "aspirations" at France's expense and the future relations of Germany and Italy with Nationalist Spain.

Schacht's reported assignment was regarded in well-informed quarters as even more important, however, and of considerable significance to all countries which strive for world trade.

It was understood that Schacht would take the initiative within the next few weeks with a number of trips to European nations, particularly Rumania, where recent British and French economic moves in a territory which Berlin regards as without the Nazi orbit, has caused misgivings here.

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CHICAGO WHEAT PRICES LOWER

Liverpool Quotations Bring Fractional Declines In Domestic Markets

CHICAGO, March 4 (AP)—Wheat prices averaged fractionally lower here early today, influenced by Liverpool quotations that were lower than due and forecasts of additional moisture in the domestic winter wheat belt.

Opening 1-8 higher to 1-4 lower, May 68 3-4, July 68-68 7-8, wheat prices later held near this level. Corn started 1-8-2-8 off, May 19 1-8, July 19 1-2.
