Nonpartisan Substitute Is Offered

A brief hearing on a joint resolution to amend the constitution to provide for nonpartisan election of county officers was conducted by the senate judiciary committee Tuesday.

The resolution must be passed by two legislatures and voted upon by the people before the change can be made to take county offices out of partisan politics.

Sen. Taylor Brown (R., Oshkosh), who introduced a bill for immediate nonpartisan county elections, withdrew his bill and introduced the resolution as a substitute.

"I don't know how my name got on the resolution except that I sponsored a similar resolution two years ago," Sen. Conrad Shearer (R., Kenosha), co-author of the resolution, told the committee.

State Bill Would Aid Counties' Civil Service

A bill to enable counties to establish civil service and to call upon the state bureau of personnel for assistance was introduced Tuesday in the Wisconsin senate by Sen. Fred Risser (P., Madison).

The Risser bill provides for a general enabling act to permit counties to establish civil services for all employees and to permit the establishment of county pension systems for employees.

In Dane county, a resolution is now pending before a county board committee providing for civil service for county workers. The sheriff's department is now under civil service.
