Farmers, U. W. Budget

Farmers and union labor joined forces at a special hearing Thursday, urging the legislature joint finance committee to recommend Pres. Clarence A. Dykstra's University of Wisconsin budget. Both groups opposed Gov. Heil's proposed budget cut of more than \$1,000,000 as a thread to educa-tional opportunities for farmers

and workers.
William Card, Madison, of the
American Federation of Teachers, told the committee the cut would mean salary reductions to lower paid university employes. He pointed out that only 13 per cent of the employes receive more than \$3,000 a year salaries. He said 14 per cent get between \$1,800 and \$3,000 a year, 35 per cent receive between \$900 and \$1,800 and the remaining 38 per cent less than

Low Brackets Hit "The burden of the cut will fall on those with low salaries," Card

said, "because not enough could be saved by cutting the higher brackets." When university pay waivers went into effect in 1932 the lower

salaried employes suffered most. he said, even though the top salaries took a greater waiver.

Card also asserted the teachers union opposes increased student

tuition fees, explaining the faculty does not want to benefit at the expense of the student. Oppose Fee Increase Henry Rutz, Milwaukee, educaion director of the state federation of labor, opposed the cut on grounds it would affect the school

for workers and might lead to fee ncreases. J. H. Friedrich, Milwaukee, of the Federated Trades council, said the AFL feels the citizens should have the fullest possible measure of education.

Claude Lyons, Madison, of the Farmers' Equity union, declared his organization fears fees may be increased to the detriment of farm youths who desire a college education.
