West Point Alumni to Join With Academy in Anniversary Program

West Point alumni, serving as officers at far-flung army outposts or as military attaches in distant parts of the world, will be reunited with the "Wagon" tonight when the National Broadcasting Co. shortwaves a special program celebrating the 137th anniversary of the founding of the military academy.

The program will be heard here from 8:30 to 9 over NBC-WIBA. The broadcast will be recorded and transmitted by shortwave stations W8XX, W8XL, and W3XAL, using the South American beam, from 9:15 to 9:45 p. m. On Sunday from 9:30 to 10 a. m. CST, shortwave station W3XL, beamed to Europe, will carry the program.

The celebration will feature singing and playing of traditional songs and ballads of the army by the cadet chapel choir of 180 voices and the 88-piece military academy enlisted men's band.

Maj. Gen. Dennis E. Nolan, president of the association of graduates of the academy, will speak from the Hotel Astor, New York, where the New York Society of West Point graduates will be holding its annual dinner. Brig. Gen. Jay L. Benedict, superintendent of the academy, will talk at West Point.

Former Labor Editor Ends Jail Term

JANESVILLE—(U.P.)—John L. Louis, former editor of a labor paper here who was convicted of criminal libel last September, was at liberty today after completing a six months' sentence in the Rock county jail.

He was released on order of Circuit Judge Jesse Earle after Al Probst, E. Atkinson, who signed a bond of \$1,000 which was set several weeks ago when Louis was arraigned on additional charges arising from a grand jury investigation. He pleaded innocent and probably will come up for trial during the March term of circuit court.

Louis originally was sentenced to eight months in jail by Circuit Judge James Wickham of Eau Claire but his sentence was commuted to six months by former Gov. La Follette.

Women Debaters Win Both Sides of 'Work' Problem

The University of Wisconsin women's debating team upholding the affirmative side of the question, "Resolved, that legislation be adopted prohibiting married women whose husbands are providing the family a reasonable standard of living from engaging in any regular work or occupation for compensation," defeated Minnesota Thursday night at Bascom hall.

Meantime, the Wisconsin squad arguing the negative side of the same question defeated the Minnesota affirmative squad in Minneapolis.

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Five Typhoid Deaths Mark New Low

Wisconsin's 64 cases and five deaths of typhoid fever last year established new low records in the state's perennial campaign against the disease, and may form the lowest rates in the nation according to the state board of health.

Since 1910, when 558 Wisconsin people died of typhoid, state and city workers have increased preventive measures against it, and have made surprising progress in view of the fact that typhoid fever can be communicated through water, milk, and foodstuffs, and by the disease's carriers and carriers of the disease.

"Safeguarding all public water supplies has brought the typhoid menace under reasonable control, and none of last year's 64 cases could be traced to a public supply," said Dr. H. M. Guilford, state epidemiologist.

Drinking from untested private wells and from rivers, lakes, and streams combine with the unidentifiable typhoid carrier to form Wisconsin's chief typhoid problem today, Dr. Guilford said.

Of last year's 64 cases, 36 were rural residents and 10 of the 28 urban residents had spent some time in rural areas shortly before contracting the disease.

Records of the state board's bureau of communicable diseases show that there are 38 known typhoid carriers living in the state. This group is prohibited from handling foodstuffs, and is subject to further regulations aimed at preventing the spread of the ailment to others.

Educating the rural public in safeguarding their private wells, and the general public in avoiding uncertain sources of drinking water, will further reduce the typhoid menace, Dr. Guilford said.

Joseph O'Neill, Shullsburg, Dies Suddenly at 75

SHULLSBURG—Joseph O'Neill, 75, of Shullsburg died suddenly Wednesday morning. He dropped dead while walking to a neighbor's house.

Mr. O'Neill, son of the late Andrew and Jen Lawler O'Neill, was born in Seymour township north of here, Dec. 1, 1863. The greater part of his life was spent in Seymour township, where he was engaged in farming during the ac-

tive years of his life. He later moved to Shullsburg township where he served several terms as town treasurer. Two years ago he moved to this city, where he has since made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Viola Trebian.

Survivors are his wife, the former Miss Mary Meade; four daughters; Mrs. Elmer Curran and Mrs. Trebian, Shullsburg; Mrs. Elizabeth Willman, Milwaukee; Mrs. Nellie Kennedy, Montana; two sons, Dr. William O'Neill, LaCrosse, and Frank O'Neill, Stockton, Ill.

Funeral services will be held Saturday morning at St. Matthew's Catholic church, the Rev.

"Dear Mr. Culbertson: I send you a hand that, in my opinion, represents a very nice example of capitalizing one's luck. It occurred in a match-point duplicate game in this city. My partner (South) was the only one in the room to fulfill a three no trump contract. Indeed, while four other declarers were meeting defeat, he actually made an overtrick. This was the hand:
"South, dealer.
"Neither side vulnerable.
"Match-point duplicate.

♠ 6 2
♥ A Q 7 5 4
♦ Q 7 3
♣ 8 3

WEST
♠ J 10 5 4
♥ K 6
♦ A J 8 4
♣ 10 9 2

EAST

The bidding:
North West North East
1 diamond Pass 1 heart Pass
1 spade Pass 2 hearts Pass
2 trump Pass 3 hearts Pass
3 no trump Pass Pass Pass

Perhaps South's last bid was somewhat of a stretch, but he was an excellent card player who had full confidence in his ability to get every trick out of the play. I must say that he justified this confidence in himself.

West opened the ten of clubs, the only unbid suit. Declarer won and boldly led his singleton heart and took the ace. Discarding a club from his own hand; then took the spade finesse to the queen. It held and the next play was a low diamond to dum-

Yes, I fully agree that the declarer played the hand to the best possible advantage and that he fully deserved a top score on the board. The heart finesse was, of course, lucky and he also was fortunate to find the diamond ace in front of the diamond queen, which made the queen an entry for proper manipulation of the spade suit. Nevertheless, declarer's handling of the spade situation and his eventual throw-in play on West deserved full credit.

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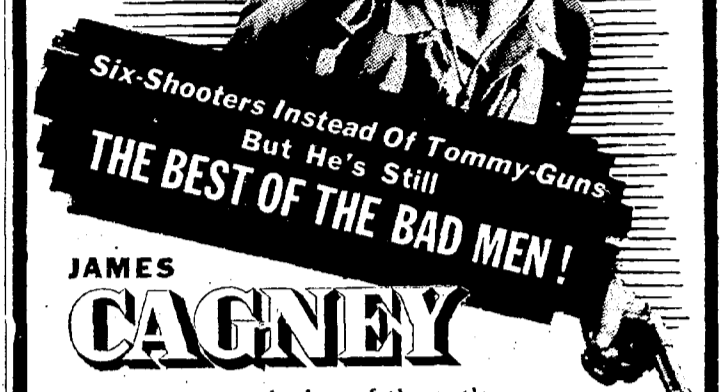
