THE GREATEST FARMER IN HISTORY-Mohammed Ali (1769-1849), Pasha of Egypt, became the greatest farmer in history, by the simple act of appropriating every acre of farmland in Egypt. Every farmer lost his land, and the ruler acquired the title to the property without extending compensation. The total acreage which the Pasha acquired in this fashion was about 12,000 square miles. The owners were permitted to continue cultivating their land, but not as owners. They became tenants of their own property overnight and by a single stroke of the pen.
