

# Bellamy, Florence George To Be Guests Of Bing Crosby

### Film Star And Soprano To Swap Quips With Crooner And Sage Of Van Buren Thursday Night

A more than casual chat with Bing Crosby and Bob Burns is in store for Ralph Bellamy, of the movies, and Florence George, soprano, when they appear on the Music Hall Thursday. In addition to Bing and Bob, the regular company includes the Music Mads and John Scott Trotter's orchestra.

Having shown up several times on the hour that's heard over WEA-F at 10 p. m. Ralph Bellamy now may be called an alumnus of the Hall. Bellamy's latest motion picture is "Trade Winds" in which he plays a conscientious but none-too-bright detective. He first discovered his flair for comedy roles in a visit with Bing some time back.

Florence George is not only good-looking but also possesses a sparkling sense of humor. In addition to her singing, she will appear to what Bing has called a "play-happier" in a stream-lined interview with Bob Burns stopping "milkmaid" from time to time to add a little heckling.

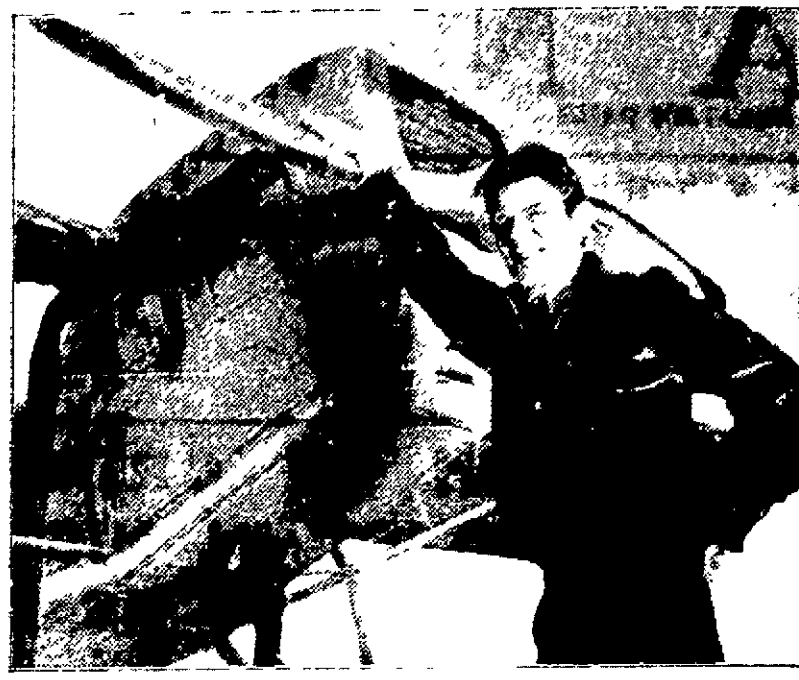

### "Assassin Of Youth" And "Swing It Professor" Are Attractions; "Oklahoma Kid" At Ohio

"Assassin of Youth," the daring story of dangerous effects of marijuana on the youth of today is scheduled to open at the Quilna preview Friday night. Pinky Tomlin in "Swing It Professor" is the title of the second feature on the Quilna's new bill. This is a gay musical comedy filled with lilting tunes and comedy.

Thursday and Friday are the last two days for the showing of the western epic, "The Oklahoma Kid" starring James Cagney, Humphrey Bogart and Rosemary Lane at the Ohio. Opening Saturday will be the ice extravaganza "The Ice Follies of 1939," "King of the Underworld," starring Humphrey Bogart and Kay Francis, and "Dark Rapture," an unusual jungle drama, are the main features now showing thru Friday at the Sigma. Opening Saturday will be Douglas "Wrong Way" Corrigan's first motion picture, "The Flying Irishman."

"Service Deluxe" with Constance Bennett, Vincent Price and Charles Ruggles, and "Tarnished Angel," starring Sally Eilers, are the two pictures currently featured at the State.

Charles Starrett in "West of Cheyenne," a thrilling fast moving western, and "Federal Man Hunt" starring Robert Livingston and June Travis are the Lyric's offerings.

In his first starring role since making his mark in Hollywood felt as a featured player in "Angels With Dirty Faces," "The Amazing Dr. Chatterhouse," and "Crime School," Humphrey Bogart, film noir's ex-sangster, stars in "King of the Underworld," at the Sigma theatre.
