

"I don't think I'll ever forget that scene. I've told you that the stage was small. As a matter of fact, it was so small that when you got on it you felt like you were looking out of a window at the audience.

"I had to get shot in the scene. The other passengers on the plane had decided they didn't want to die after all but I had made up my mind more than ever to die. So someone was going to plug me.

"That presented a real problem. The stage was so small and as I am six feet two and a half inches tall the director decided that if I fell down on the stage there wouldn't be any 100m for the rest of the cast

"We finally fixed it up so that I would be shot in the stomach. That gave me time enough to stagger around a bit and then at an opportune moment I fell thru a door. Only my feet remained on the stage and that left enough room for the rest of the cast.




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
