Dr. Morgan was dismissed by President Roosevelt when he refused to tell the president grounds for his charges against he TVA administration. Board Members David E. Lili-

enthal and Dr. H. A. Morgan acted with "forbearance and dignity during the severe strain to which they were subjected," the majority said. "This cannot be said of Dr. A. E. Morgan."
