State Bankers Meet at U. W. This Week

More than 500 Wisconsin bankers are expected to meet on the University of Wisconsin campus Tuesday for the opening of the two-day second annual conference on banking sponsored by the university school of commerce in cooperation with the Wisconsin Bankers Assn. and the state banking department.

All sessions of the conference, which starts at 9:15 a. m., will be held in the Memorial Union. The problems of bank earnings, investments, and mortgages will be discussed in separate panel discussions during the first three sessions Tuesday morning and afternoon, and Wednesday morning.

Schmedeman to Speak
Discussion leaders on the bank earnings problem Tuesday morning will be Dr. Walter A. Morton, professor of economics at the university; J. Forbes Campbell, of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., Washington, D. C.; and Harry W. Barney, chief examiner of the state banking department.

The discussion on mortgages will be led by A. G. Schmedeman, former governor of Wisconsin and now state director of the State Housing Administration; John D. Jones, Jr., general agent of the Farm Credit Administration, St. Paul; and C. S. Young, vice-president of the Federal Reserve Bank, Chicago.

Addresses will be given at general sessions Tuesday morning by Dr. Edwin E. Witte, professor of economics at the university, on "The Economic Status of Wisconsin"; and by Harry B. Hall, Milwaukee, on "What I Expect from My Banker".

At the fourth and closing session of the conference Wednesday afternoon, addresses will be given by Dr. William Bayard Taylor, professor of finance at the university, on "Debts, Bankers, and Depressions"; and by Dr. Herman B. Wells, president of Indiana University, on "The Future for Commercial Banking".

A feature of the conference will be the annual banquet to be held at 6:15 p. m. Tuesday in the Union's Great Hall. Main speaker at the banquet will be Harper Leech, economist and journalist, whose subject will be the Liquidation of the 19th Century.

S. N. Pictard, president of the Wisconsin Bankers Assn., will preside at the banquet; C. A. Dykstra, president of the university, will greet the bankers and the university women's chorus of 60 voices under the direction of Miss Florence Bergendahl, will present a half-hour program of songs.

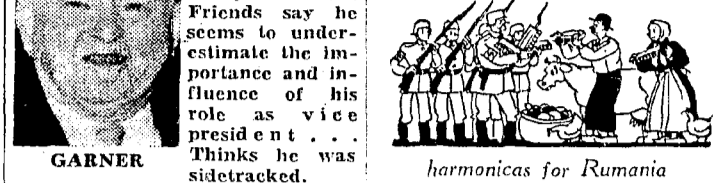

Another candidate for the presidency, Sen. Bennett Clark, of Missouri, has changed his tactics. When the streets that play on the White House lawn first began to beckon last year, Clark climbed aboard the water wagon and became quite a solemn fellow. But he found it rather lonely up there, and began to doubt whether a water wagon was a good campaign wagon. Now he has discreetly climbed down, at least as far as the axle.

Among the code experts, in these days of breathless international and military secrets, there's great glee when they can "break down" each other's codes... So far no secret code has been devised which other experts can't figure out... The British thought they had an airtight code, and rather triumphantly flaunted it by sending

over a message in it to the U. S. army. Believe it or not, almost by return wireless they got it back, completely and accurately decoded... What's more, to add insult to injury, it turned out that the "airtight" British code was based on a U. S. Navy code—our army cryptologists found the letters "USNAVY" discreetly planted in the British code.

Incidentally, the allies had copies of the German secret code all through the World War. But what's more alarming is the likelihood that transatlantic phone conversations between President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull and their ambassadors in Europe are eavesdropped quite simply by anyone in London, Berlin, Moscow, Paris, or Rome who wants to hear what they're chatting about.

Their chats, of course, are "scrambled" at the sending end and "unscrambled" at the receiving end by a device which reduces their words to a jargon. But any competent amateur can arrange two receivers to unscramble them, too. So maybe they'd better talk in impenetrable American slang.

Two of the commonest errors in designation of high officials involve ambassadors and the chief justice. An American ambassador is not the representative of the U. S. A., but the representative of the president.

And the Chief Justice is not the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court but the Chief Justice of the U. S. A. Got that clear? CAPITAL CAVIAR: Of the 33 naval officers who have commanded the Naval Observatory here, 24 have had beards or whiskers... If Germany keeps gobbling up countries, there will be a need for an unemployed diplomats club in Washington—now Prochnik, of Austria; Hurbán of Czech-Slovakia, and de los Rios, of Spain, are eligible... So many wives and relatives crowd into the Senators' dining room that the senators themselves have to wait for tables... There may be a musical revival in Rumania when the Nazi begin to dump tin harmonicas there in exchange for oil and grain.
