

Reunited Brothers Push Search For Third Member

Alan Kent Will Referee Battle Of The Sexes; Composer, News Editor On Information Please

Two brothers, recently united after forty years during which neither knew the other existed, will institute a search for a third missing brother on "We, The People" over WABC Tuesday at 9:00 p. m.

Other guests on the program to be interviewed by Gabriel Heatter will include a prosecuting attorney and the man he put behind bars in 1919; the only woman circus clown in the world; a male advisor to the lovelorn and the last man to look upon the body of Abraham Lincoln.

Russell Rogers of Wilmington, Del., early orphaned and brought up in an orphan's home until adopted by a family named Rogers, didn't know he had a brother until recently. A long-distance telephone call from one A. R. Gonder of Des Moines, Iowa, who had traced his relationship thru court records after two score years of separation, recently advised him of the fact. They will institute a search for a third missing brother thru the facilities of "We, The People."

Frank Crummit and Julia Sanderson will line up their armies for another contest of wits during the Battle of the Sexes program Tuesday at 9:00 p. m., over WFAF. The mens' team, captained by "General" Crummit, will carry the attack into the women's camp in an effort to establish their claim to mental superiority. Sigma Will Present New Twin Bill On Wednesday

Shirley Temple's Latest In Technicolor Featured At Quilna; "Dodge City" Is Ohio's Headliner

Tuesday is the final day of the showing of the two pictures at the Sigma. They are "Cafe Society," starring Madeleine Carroll and Fred MacMurray, and "Risky Business," featuring George Murphy and Dorothea Kent.

Opening Wednesday will be "Duke of West Point," starring Louis Hayward, Tom Brown, Richard Carlson and Joan Fontaine, and "Secret Service of the Air," starring Ronald Reagan.

A heartstirring drama, "The Little Princess," now is showing at the Quilna theatre. Shirley Temple is starred in this film for the first time in technicolor. Anita Louise, Richard Greene and Ian Hunter are in the supporting roles.

Errol Flynn, Olivia de Havilland, Ann Sheridan and Alan Hale are starred in the fast moving epic of the lawless west entitled, "Dodge City." The picture is showing at the Ohio theatre.

"Wings of the Navy," starring George Brent, John Payne and Olivia de Havilland, and "Say It In French," featuring Ray Milland and Olympe Bradna, are the two pictures current at the State.

A story of brave men who stand together in the tradition of the navy is seen in the current Lyric picture, "Pride of the Navy," James Dunn and Rochelle Hudson head the cast.

The Higgins family, a typical American family, is seen in the second Lyric picture, "My Wife's Relatives."

Mary Nash had already accepted the role of Miss Minchin in support of Shirley Temple in "The Little Princess," technicolor version of the great classic, showing at the Quilna theatre.

Then she learned that the script required her to slap Shirley. Miss Nash immediately told Production Chief Harry F. Zanuck that, unless the scene was cut out of the film, she would be forced to refuse the part.

The actress explained that she had received hundreds of letters from the fans, upbraiding her for her "cruelty" to Shirley in "Heidi."

So in the revised script of "The Little Princess," the slap was converted into a mild shoving.

Richard Greene and Anita Louise head Shirley's supporting cast in the romantic leads, while also prominently featured are Ian Hunter, Cesar Romero, Arthur Treacher, Mary Nash, Sybil Jason, Miles Mander and Marcia Mae Jones. Walter Lang directed the film.

With Joan Fontaine portraying the leading lady, and with Louis Hayward, Richard Carlson, Tom Brown and Alan Curtis appearing as the four important male roles in the story, the thrilling adventures and romances of pebes enrolled at the United States Military Academy are humorously and dramatically unfolded in Edward Small's "The Duke of West Point," which is scheduled for its initial showing at the Sigma theatre Wednesday.

As the story opens, Steve Early arrives from England, where he has been spectacularly successful on the Cambridge Varsity Rugby team, to start life as a West Point Cadet. Accustomed to a goofy amount of pampering by his wealthy parents and society friends, Steve is "meat" for the yearling corporals who proceed to make his life thoroughly miserable and to take him down several pegs.

How Steve, along with the other pebes, go from one mis-adventure to another, weathering storms and

heartbreak until the thrilling climax, when West Point plays its annual ice hockey game with the Royal Military college of Canada, is told in a series of fast-moving, poignant scenes.

Hazardous and thrilling adventures of the men of the United States Secret Service will be dramatized in a new series of pictures "Secret Service Adventures," starring Ronald Reagan, which makes its bow at the Sigma theatre Tuesday. The leadoff film is "Secret Service of the Air."

The pictures of this series will not only be exciting and interesting but there will be no question of the authenticity of the incidents on which they are based, for all the plots will come from material furnished by W. H. Moran, former chief of the Secret Service.

"Secret Service of the Air" is concerned mainly with the breaking up of a gang which has been smuggling aliens into the United States by air.

"No one ever calls me 'Buck McHugh,'" he sighed. "It's very discouraging."

He finished the script and got back on his feet. "Some day," he warned, "I'm going to play a shootin' role. The studio won't let me kill Flynn in this picture but my time will come. When it does I'll be ready. I'm going to build a target practice range in my basement."
