Dead Man's Kin Believed Located Here

Police Tuesday unearthed a possible clue that the body of a man reportedly seen in Chicago river may be the missing brother of a maid working in a Madison home.

A further check was planned after Deft. Capt. John R. Arnold received a circular from Deft. Capt. John L. Sullivan of Chicago police, in which the recovery of the body was reported.

The circular reported the man might have relatives at an address given as 414 Virginia terrace. Arnold checked the address here and found the maid working there, Agnes Schatz, had a brother, Anthony, who has been missing since the first of the year.

The body of the man found had been in the river for some time, Arnold said. He said he is checking with another brother, Joseph, now living in Chicago, to obtain further information.

Order Forbids Fire Insurance in Marine Policies

Insurance Commissioner Harry J. Mortenson issued Tuesday a formal order forbidding issuance of insurance covering fire hazards under marine policies in accordance with the supreme court decision handed down recently holding such policies contrary to the Wisconsin statutes.

The order first states definitely that the standard fire insurance policy of the state of Wisconsin must be used where the hazard of fire insurance is written. It also is written in the order that marine policies can only cover marine hazards as defined in the order.

SAN JOSE, Calif. (U.P.)—Jack Baldwin, San Jose state college sophomore, paid off a \$5 bet today after he failed to kiss 20 different girls in 30 minutes, but he said it was worth the money.

Women Plan Central Group to Aid Labor

MILWAUKEE (U.P.)—Better promotion for the purchase of union made products is expected to result from formation of a Wisconsin state federation of women's auxiliaries of labor, John J. Handley, secretary of the state labor federation, said today.

Women's auxiliaries of the state will meet here May 1 and 2 to form the new organization, later to be incorporated into a national federation.

At present, Handley said, most of the AFL locals in the state have women's auxiliaries made up of wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of union men.

"They're organized for the purpose of assisting labor movements and for the social functions that go with it," Handley explained.

I. M. Ormburn, head of the union trade department of the AFL, instigated the formation of a national auxiliary organization at the national AFL convention a year ago, he said.

Preliminary steps in Wisconsin toward this end were taken at the state labor federation convention in September at Sheboygan. Mrs. Elizabeth Bunce, Janesville, was appointed head of a committee to plan for the women's convention here.

Handley estimated that about 75 locals in the state will send two delegates each. With this central organization, he said, the women will be in a better position to promote the purchase of union made products. He also believed it will give the unions better support.

South Wind Aids Fire Fighters Save Community

BUTLER, Wis. (U.P.)—Fire threatened to destroy Butler today, but a providential south wind and the assistance of fire department units from Waukesha and Menomonee falls saved all, but two buildings.

Lack of adequate facilities prevented fire fighters and several hundred volunteers from saving the Suburban hotel and the adjoining residence of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Schobart, Proprietor of Herma Zache said his hotel housed 25 guests, mostly railroad workers. No one was injured and most of the personal belongings and household goods of the two places were saved.

The hotel loss was estimated at about \$6,000, and that of the residence about \$2,300.

Butler is a community of about 55 inhabitants, located about 12 miles northwest of Milwaukee.
