NEW YORK, April 15-(AP)-Quiet buying dropped the stock market in today's early dealings and leaders moved up fractions to more than a point.

Prominent gainers at the opening were U. S. Steel, Bethichem, Chrysler, General Motors, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Southern Pacific, Pennsylvania, Westinghouse and U. S. Rubber. Among items scanned by market analysts were:

The federal reserve board estimated department store sales for the first week in April were 22 per cent ahead of the comparable period a vear ago. The earlier Easter this year accounted in part for the increase.

The Machine Tool Builders-assn reported a sharp rise in the dollar volume of new orders booked during the first quarter. The total was said to have been the best for any quarter since the final months of 1937.

WASHINGTON, April 15 -(UP)-Germany plans further economic advances in southeastern Europe, foreign attaches of the agriculture department reported today.

Adolf Hitler already has obtained control of Rumania's agricultural and raw material resources under the five-year economic pact signed by the Nazis and King Carol of Rumania, reports from attaches at Belgrade and Berlin said.

"The German government regards the agreement as one of the most important steps yet taken toward solving the foodstuff, feedstuff and raw materials problem of that nation," the department said.

"It also regards the pact as a forerunner of similar agreements to link that country (Germany) with Eastern and Southeastern Europe in a broad scheme for the exchange of German industrial goods against German imports from these countries of agricultural products and other raw materiais.

Balkan oil fields are in the area where Hitler seeks economic control. Wheat and other foodstuffs are raised in Rumania, Bulgaria, and Yugoslavaia. The treaty with Rumania

granted Germany the right to direct the development and expansion of agricultural and industrial raw material resources of the little kingdom whose independence Britain and France this week guaranteed.

## LINDBERGH SILENT AS HE DEBARKS

NEW YORK, April 15—(AP)— Looking rather grim and purposeful. Col. Charles A. Lindbergh is back from Europe on a private business trip with a date to appear before the house foreign affairs committee next week and testify on neutrality matters.

He disembarked from the liner Aquitania, characteristically silent and flanked by policemen, last night. Rep. Bloom (D-NY) said Lind-

bergh would testify next Tuesday or Wednesday before the committee, which is considering changes in the neutrality law. Bloom, acting chairman, said he hoped the flier would have definite recommendations for insuring the neutrality of the United States in the event of war abroad.
