LAURELS FOR MR. HUGHES On Tuesday a great chief justice was 77... The capital es-teems him as highly and fondly as it did the great Justice Holmes Twice he



be en 32 presidents and only 11 chief justices . . Teddy Roose velt was ready to hand it to N. Y.'s Gov. Hughes in 1908--he was mature Tom Dewey of his day — but he didn't lift a finger. And in 1916

he innocently hook the wrong hands in Calif ornia, lost California by 3,800 votes, lost the presidency by California's 13 delegates.

But the republic is grateful. He'd never have lived to 77 . . . He arises at 0:30, strolls at 8 a. m Chats amiably with neighbors' chauffeurs—like Mrs. Ed Meredith's courtly Baker. He's had impulses (I'm told) to remove that once reddish beard, but couldn't tamper with a national institution...But it's shorter than it was. b. 1 1

He read at 3, completed high school at 11, college at 19, after three years off . . . He advises ambitious young lawyers not to work too hard, confides that he spent much of his time at college playing cards . . . His mind is photographic; he can absorb a longish book in an hour . . . After he dictates a speech he can deliver it from memory without notes.



Some wags accosted him

Shy behind his beard, he sufered when two wags once accosted him on Fifth ave, when he was Secretary of State, yammering his title. He escaped in a cab... His fan mail is next to FDR's... Though liberal Senators Norris, Borah, and young La Foliette (not to mention Carter Glass!) mistakenly opposed his appointment, as a reactionary, he is actually on the liberal side of center, politically . . . Not one of his court votes is undebatably reactionary. Most are obviously liberal.

He can tell stories in Irish, Scotch, German, and Jewish dia-lects... In 1916 he favored a firm attitude toward Germany (as FDR does today); it was his peace-atany-price, too-proud-to-fight op-ponents (led by Woodrow Wilson) who were sucked into war . . Like Justice McReynolds, whom Teddy appointed as a liberal (!), Hughes hasn't turned out as Hoover, who appointed him, ex-

His lunch is always the same: Two poached eggs, two slices of toast . . . The Hughes' dine out only on Saturdays: they know by Christmas where they'll be dining in May . . . But as secretary of state he entertained and dined out six evenings a week, the life of the party . . . Yet he broke a chief justice precedent by attending the Gridiron dinner.




