## FDR Talk, Ball Games Lead Broadcasts Set for Network Monday

An address by President Roosevelt and descriptions of two baseball games will be broadcast Monday on the networks. The president will speak at 5 p. m. addressing the National Public Conference. The talk will be carried by WMAQ, WENR, WFLW, WBBM, and WJLD. The official opening of the 1939 baseball season will be broadcast at 2 p. m. by WJLD, which will broadcast the Senators- Yankees game in Washington. The Yankees-White Sox battle will be described on WGN, WFLW, and WBBM at 2:55 p. m. and on WJLD at 2:30.

## William Card Critical of State Budget

Criticizing the state budget submitted Friday by the joint finance committee, William Card, legislative representative for the Wisconsin State Conference on Social Legislation, said in a radio talk Saturday, "It looks as if, under the proposed budget, life is going to be harder for two big groups in our state—our old people and our young people." Card asserted that the committee recommendation for old age pensions and mothers' pensions is "between three and five million dollars short of what it would take to keep the pensions at their present levels." "Unless the budget is changed," Card charged, "the pensions will be reduced sharply." Maintaining that the educational budget is \$2,500,000 short of what is needed for the next two years," Card said, "For the young people it means cutting into their chance for higher education."

**Educators Stress 'Social Sense' Duty**  
Emphasis on developing responsibility among today's school children keyed the closing session of the annual spring conference of Wisconsin secondary school principals Saturday in the Memorial Union. Speakers were Dr. Katherine Taylor, chief of the division of prevention and education of the Wisconsin state department of mental hygiene; Dr. Wilford M. Aiken, Ohio State university, chairman of the commission on relations of secondary school and colleges of the Progressive Education assn., and Dr. Matthew H. Willing, professor of education at the University of Wisconsin. Dr. Taylor, speaking on the "Personal Problems of Modern Youth," stressed the idea of personal development.

"The three feelings which should be instilled in the growing child are adequacy, security, and purpose," she said. "There is also the idea of responsibility which should be steadily emphasized to the child before he reaches maturity." "There are four types of changes being made in American high schools today," related Dr. Aiken speaking on "Attempts of Schools to Meet Personal Problems of Pupils." They include the changing of conventional subjects, the integration of these subjects, the introduction of more culture courses, and the "core" or the direct attack on the student problems, necessitating new curricula.

In summarizing the two day conference results, Dr. Willing laid special emphasis on the need for urgent application of democracy in educational reforms of the future. "The mistaken idea that democ-

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
