Fibber McGee will welcome Molly back to the Fibber McGee and Company program Tuesday, from 9:30 to 10:00 p. m., over WEAF.

Molly (Mrs. Jim Jordan), rejoins her comedian husband on the air after an absence of more than a year. She has been heard only once since her last regular appearance, in October, 1937.

Since Fibber (Jim Jordan) brought his program to Hollywood early this year, Molly has been a constant spectator at rehearsals, Bill Thompson, Isabel Randolph, Harold Peary, Donald Novis, Billy Mills and his orchestra, and the Four Notes will join in a welcome to Molly on her return.

Radio actresses and radio announcers will be heard in new roles over WEAF Tuesday at 9:00 p. m., when they oppose each other on the Battle of the Sexes quiz program.

The team of actresses will be composed of Hancey Castle, the NBC Girl in The ABC of NBC series; Fanny Mae Baldridge, who has been heard on Rudy Vallee's program, and others; Blanche Gladstone, who has been heard with Easy Aces, and Elsie May Gordon. The announcers, all of whose voices are familiar to NBC listeners, are Milton Cross, Ben Grauer, George Hick and Jack Costello.

May Robson, grand old lady of the films, will visit the show as guest of Bob Hope during the broadcast Tuesday from 10 to 10:30 p. m. The Australian-born actress, who has been appearing before the public for more than half a century, will give Hope a few lessons in heading off the other members of the cast in a series of sketches. Other contributors to the variety program will be Patsy Kelly, comedienne; Jerry Colonna, the mad professor; Skinnay Ennis, singing orchestra leader; the Six Hits and a Miss, vocal group, and Bill Goodwin, announcer.

"Pygmalion" Is Story Of A Man Who Took A Girl From The Gutters And Made Her Into A Duchess

One of the season's outstanding motion picture productions, "Pygmalion," the story of a man who took a girl from the gutters and made her a duchess, is scheduled to open Wednesday at the Ohio. The film is taken from the novel by George Bernard Shaw and stars Leslie Howard and a new discovery, Wendy Hiller.

Tuesday is the closing day for "Love Affair" starring Irene Dunne and Charles Boyer at the Ohio.

Tuesday is also the last day for "East Side of Heaven" the gay musical comedy featuring Bing Crosby, Joan Blondell, Mischa Auer and "Sandy" at the Sigma. There is plenty of comedy, music and romance in this delightful picture.

Opening Wednesday at the Sigma will be "Four Girls in White" starring Ann Rutherford, Florence Rice, Mary Howard, Una Merkel and "Persons in Hiding" starring J. Carroll Naish.

The two pictures at the Quilna are of entirely different nature in that one, "Let Us Live," is a human dramatic story of two persons falsely accused of murder, and the other "Lone Wolf Spy Hunt," is a mystery comedy. Henry Fonda and Maureen O'Sullivan co-star in the first film and Warren William and Ida Lupino in the latter.

Opening Tuesday at the Lyric are these two hits, "Exposed" and "Mr. Wong, Detective." As the titles suggest there are plenty of action thrills in both features. "Hold That Kiss" is a riotous romantic comedy starring Mickey Rooney as the "hot" leader of a swing band and Maureen O'Sullivan as his sister, is current at the State. Dennis O'Keefe is seen as Miss O'Sullivan's sweetheart. "Young Dr. Kildare" starring Lew Ayres and Lionel Barrymore is the second feature at the State.

An engulfing love at first sight between two heart-breakers who have never loved before with true hearts is the exciting pivotal situation of "Love Affair," co-starring Irene Dunne and Charles Boyer.

With a New York-bound ship as a romantic setting, Miss Dunne, as a charming woman of the world, and Boyer as a famous European playboy, are brought together in a casual meeting which develops into a momentous occasion. Mrs. Dunne suffers a serious accident a few minutes before the important rendezvous. Dramatic moments mount with compelling power until the couple's happy reunion in a soul-stirring climax.

One of Mischa Auer's youthful ambitions, to be a concert singer, was almost realized in "East Side of Heaven," now at the Sigma theatre.

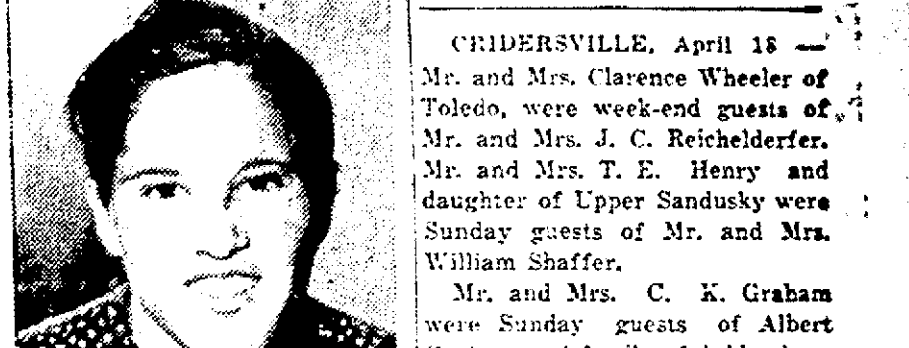
