Hint 100 Deaths in Philadelphia Murder Ring

PHILADELPHIA —(U.P)— Mrs. Carina Favato's confession that she poisoned three persons, in-cluding her husband and stepson, to collect their insurance, convinced authorities today that her syndicate had committed at least 100 murders.

For weeks, evidence had been accumulating of murders on a grand scale, in which poor and obscure persons were heavily insured and slowly poisoned with arsenic by "witch doctors" who pretended to be treating them. A principal suspect was Paul Petrillo, 45, a tailor, whom detec-

tive Sgt. Samuel Riccardi said had "claimed to be constantly in touch with spirits and said he could and did talk with Old Nick himself." Petrillo is awaiting trial for murder.
