Adolf Hitler's Reply to President Roosevelt on Air Friday Morning



Chancellor Adolf Hitler's speech before the special session of Germany's Reichstag to answer the dramatic plea for peace in Europe sent by President Roosevelt will be heard in this country at 5 a. m. Friday. Stations WIBA, WGN, and WMAQ will air the international broadcast at this time, while stations WBBM and WIND will rebroadcast the dictator's address at 2 in the afternoon to accommodate the non-waking listeners.

Tonight, as a prologue to Hitler's address Friday morning, a round table discussion of the President's peace proposal and the anticipated reply will be aired by station WIBA at 7:30 p. m. Col. W. C. Weaver, Prof. A. P. Fernbach, and Mrs. Joan Swadwell will participate in the discussion.

NEW YORK—The spectre of dead arms and ailing pitching muscles, of lost speed and effectiveness, which haunted pre-season sport stories has been largely dissipated by what happened on those opening days, scattered through a rain-swept week.

The frown of Cleveland's anxiety over Johnny Allen's chipped elbow gave way to a smile of joy as young Robert Feller proved better than he ever was in the opener against the Detroit Tigers.

And in the Yankees' opener the day before old Robert Grove, though Boston couldn't win behind him, turned in a masterly, brilliantly-pitched game. At times that "dead" arm of Lefty's seems to regain all its famous speed.

The same day—though not in an opener (it was the Giants' second tilt of the season)—Hal Schumacher threw the ball with speed and no pain though it was expected his elbow, operated on last winter, would give him trouble. There wasn't an ache in it at the end of the game. The Giants lost to Brooklyn, but it was highly comforting to them to learn their fears about that elbow apparently were groundless.

Now all is needed is for Carl Hubbell, Johnny Allen, Dizzy Dean and some of the other ailing hurlers to turn in fine performances. And will those writers who have been moaning the sad state of big league pitching turn red!

Feller Openers' Hero

The real hero of the week-long series of opening games is Mr. Feller. And don't anyone try to challenge that statement.

The youthful Iowan again proved, as nearly as one can in a single game, that he belongs to baseball's great.

The Tigers came to Tribetown flushed with victories over the White Sox and bubbling over with confidence and assurance.

And Rapid Robert smashed them back with the scan and often faulty aid of his teammates. Three scant hits—one a pop fly—10 strikeouts and only two walks and through it all, from flagfall to finish, the Feller express roared across the plate in blinding fashion and under perfect control.

Unless injury or illness hamper the young Indian, he is headed for his best season without question. Gone is that awkwardness which made him appear an uncertain quantity in previous seasons. Gone, apparently, is the wildness which negated much of his brilliance. Gone we believe, is his own uncertainty about his ability to master any team.

Arrived is Bob Feller, pitching star.
