Ethyl, Studio Hit Snag On Her Contract

New York Model Going Back East To Get Some More Training

HOLLYWOOD, April 29.—(INS)—Ethyl Haworth, the beautiful New York model who came to Hollywood six months ago, discovered today that the promised land is just a mirage after all.

Her option came up at RKO and this slim brunette with the dancing eyes was unable to reach any satisfactory agreement with the studio. So next Monday Ethyl trains out east, first to visit the folks at her native Pittsburgh, Pa., and then on to New York.

She says she's happy to go home, but she hopes to come back—and stay, the next time.

Ethyl has had the satisfaction of appearing in every one of the 16 pictures RKO made since she arrived, a record for a newcomer, even if some of the parts were very little parts. She's in her last picture before departing now, "The Dove," with Leo Carrillo and Steffi Duna.

"I've been in a lot of pictures, but I've never been able to get really settled down to anything worth while," Ethyl informed this reporter today. "Probably you need a lot more experience than I've had. That's what I'm going to try to get. I'm going to see if I can't become associated with a good summer stock company, preferably the one at Mt. Kisco, N. Y., or up at Dennis, Mass. I'm also going to do some commercial posing in New York as soon as I get back here."

"I think if I get some good stock experience, there'll be a place in Hollywood for me. Then, I think, if I come back, I'll be back to stay."

Many girls have come to Hollywood under unusual circumstances, but Ethyl's was one of the most unusual of all.

Last fall Pan Berman, RKO production chief, was shopping in a smart New York store for a pocketbook for his wife. He happened to glance up to see Ethyl modeling an evening gown. He forgot everything else in his hurry to sign her to a contract.

In some of her darker moments since her arrival, Ethyl has wished Berman had bought the pocketbook instead.

SHEEP DIPPING EXHIBITIONS ARE SCHEDULED

(Lima News Bureau) OTTAWA, April 29.—There will be three sheep dipping demonstrations in Putnam-co on May 22, County Agent Ralph Dush said today. Locations and time have not yet been announced.

After shearing each year large flocks of sheep should be treated for control of external parasites which include ticks and lice, Dush declared.

The sheep tick after shearing time will transfer to the lamb, and lives by sucking the blood from its host. Lice operate in a similar manner.

The demonstrations will show how, by using a simple sheep dip and one dipping operation, the lice and ticks can be eradicated.

The interest for several years in dipping sheep has resulted in a demand for a custom outfit. It seems to be the practical solution to the problem of controlling these parasites. The dipping outfit to be used on May 22 will be mounted upon a two-wheel trailer. It can be converted for the dipping operation within a few minutes. The total weight of the trailer, gates, tanks and dipping equipment amounts to 1,300 pounds, and the tanks will hold 150 gallons of solution.

Small flocks can be dipped without un hitching from the car. The dipping outfit was manufactured under the guidance of Purdue university.

SHAWNEE F. F. A. PLANS FARM CLEAN UP WEEK

Roosevelt Heads Notables On Radio At World's Fair

Gov. Lehman And Mayor LaGuardia Will Join Chief Executive In Broadcast From Grounds At 1:30 P. M. Sunday

President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Gov. Herbert T. Lehman of New York and Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia of New York, speaking at the New York World's Fair grounds the day the Fair is officially opened, will be heard Sunday from 1:30 to 2 p. m. over WEAF.

President Roosevelt, Gov. Lehman and Mayor LaGuardia will go on the air from a stand in front of the \$3,000,000 Federal Exhibit building at the Fair. Grover Whalen, president of the New York World's Fair of 1939, also will speak during the program.

Constance Bennett, alias the dissoluble Marian Kirby of "Topper" fame, and Melvyn Douglas, versatile screen leading man, have been signed to co-star in the "Silver Theatre" drama directed by Conrad Nagel during the broadcast over WABC Sunday at 5 p. m.

Miss Bennett and Douglas have agreed upon a serious dramatic story at Nagel's suggestion. Music for the drama will be scored and conducted by Felix Mills, Silver theatre maestro.

Star Irene Dunne, Director Leo McCarey and screen writer Delmar Davies, the star-director-writer combination that made "Love Affair" one of Hollywood's most successful films, again will be featured in an original radio play, "Alone in Paris," with Cary Grant, Valter Connolly, Herman Bing and Oscar Bradley's orchestra, on the "Screen Guild Show" over WABC Sunday at 6:30 p. m. Miss Dunne was the star of "Love Affair," which McCarey directed and Davies wrote. Each artist will step into a similar role of the Guild program.

Hume's Bogart, screen hand, will look in on the McCarey program Sunday and look over Charles' Charlie McCarthy, who, forwardly, is toying with the idea of abandoning his new baseball uniform and climbing into his cowboy suit — one with a pearl-handled cap pistol hanging on each side.

However this encounter comes out, Bogart is scheduled for a role in a one-act play with Don Ameche on this same program, which will be heard over WEAF at 7:00 p. m.

Another guest on the program will be Edward Everett Hart, who will do a comedy spot with Don Ameche as his partner. The lucky break that brought Tyrone Power, a struggling Cincinnati actor, from five-dollar-a-week obscurity to Hollywood stardom, will be dramatized on Josef Cherniavsky's "My Lucky Break" program over WJZ at 4 p. m. Sunday.

Power's "break" followed the usual struggle for a chance on Broadway, where he met indifference despite the prominence of his late father. By chance, one day, he was introduced to Katharine Cornell and her husband, Guthrie McClintic. The pair became interested and, after he had acted as understudy to Burgess Meredith in "Flowers of the Forest," gave him a part in "Saint John."

He was successful, received a motion picture contract, and the role in "Flowers of Saint John" made him a film idol.

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(Lima News Bureau) WAPAKONETA, April 29.—The contested divorce case of Webster Bushong, St. Marys, against Myrtle Bushong, Marion, today was called again to the attention of Judge W. T. Copeland in Auglaize-co common pleas court when attorneys for the defendant filed a motion for the decree be annulled.

The case was first filed almost a year ago and resulted in a decree being granted the plaintiff last August on grounds of wilful absence and gross neglect of duty. However, the defendant filed a motion to have the decree set aside last January on grounds that the divorce was secured through fraud and that she was not properly served. The court approved the motion.

Bushong was granted his second decree several weeks ago after Judge Copeland heard evidence from both sides which tended to show that the pair was married in 1932 and that the plaintiff left her after 11 days of married life. The plaintiff contended that he had sought a reconciliation but that she refused to answer his letters and that she made no effort to fight the case until she found out that she would not secure one-half of a \$60 a month pension received by the plaintiff for being a Spanish War veteran. The date for hearing the motion for new trial has not been set.

COUNT BELSARIUS, By Robert Graves. Random House, \$3.00.

A long, exciting novel of the sixth century. It is the story of the great general Belsarius, his wife Antonina and the Emperor Justinian and Empress Theodora. It reads like a book of authentic personal history of the period and is particularly interesting in its portrayal of the characters of the two women, Antonina and Theodora, who rose from lowly stations in life to become women of wealth and position. The novel gives vivid pictures of the decadence of the Byzantine empire and of Count Belsarius's remarkable military campaigns.

This is a most unusual and engrossing biography. It is a composite story of William and Dorothy Wordsworth and Samuel Taylor Coleridge with the greater emphasis on Coleridge. The author has brought vividly to life the literary figures of a great literary period. She has held strictly to biographical and historical truth in a narrative that often reads like fiction. She has brought to the tasks the ability to analyze three divergent, yet merging personalities; and she has drawn the portrait of two extraordinary men and the extraordinary woman.

THE RAPE OF PALESTINE, BY WILLIAM BERNARD ZIFF, LONGMANS, GREEN AND CO., \$3.50.

Other political problems in Europe have overshadowed that of Palestine, but it remains nevertheless one of the problems that should be understood. This book cannot fail to clarify some of the political difficulties of that country, although criticizing the British acts and policies in the administration of the Palestine mandate.
