Outside for What Ails You

The ionic value of cool green forests, crystal lakes, the songs of birds, and the music of riffling waters—especially for people who spend the most of their lives in Plants Trees hustling cities—is no myth but a cogent actually, according to Dr. Like Johnny Did W. F. Lorenz, professor of neuropsychiatry at the University of Wisconsin Psychiatric institute.

"Recreation in a setting of woods and waters," said Lorenz, "is the one form of treatment 1 can always prescribe with a feeling of certainty that benefit will result. In the middle of life, particularly. I have found many nervous and physical conditions that can be benefitted only by this type of outdoor recreation.
"We cannot throw aside our

habits to work, habits that have been developed over years, unless we create a vacation that is stimulated by diversions, new inter ests, real pleasures. 


