Comet Due in 1939

By PAULA BIRNER will 1939 be the year for the advent of a rare and startling event—the great comet of the

wentieth century? Bizaire in appearance, with a star-like head, tens of thousands of miles across and a tail millions of miles long, with this celestial visitant appear some placid noonday? Probably so, for long overdue, is the arrival of the great comet of the twentieth century.

Halley's comet sweeping into view every 75 years is an awesome sight. People who viewed what appeared like a distant skyrocket in suspended animation in the heavens in 1910 look back at that moment as the most solemn in their lives.

During the last century six or seven great comets have appeared. the most important being those of 1858, 1861, 1881, 1882, and 1887. Since the return of Halley's comet in 1910 no truly great comet has appeared. Comets are now liable to be first discerned as telescopic objects, faint and fuzzy in appear-

In the outer regions of the so lar system, the comet's motion is slow being only two or three miles per second, but as it draws in towards perihelion its speed is in-creased tremendously. The great comet of 1843 appeared in broad daylight on February 28 and was going at the rate of 342 miles per second 78,000 miles from the sun. Its temperature of 3,000 degrees produced a tail 180 million, miles

A new comet, was announced on April 16 by a cablegram to Harvard observatory and transmitted from Professor S. Rosseland of Olso, Norway. Named the Hassel Comet after its discoverer. Its brightness is that of a third magnitude star.

Amateur astronomers and other interested persons can pick up the trail of a comet when given the position by thinking of the heavens as a dome with the observor inside and likening right ascension and declination somewhat to the latitude and longitude lines in determining the position of a locality upon the earth. Any good starmap will give right ascension and declination and thus facilitate the finding of a heavenly body.

ported on April 22 that periodic comet Kopff had a magnitude of 13 and is receding from view.




