State Labor **Board Gives** Last Report

With Wisconsin's new "employstate, the office of the now defunct of the local legion old labor relations board has released a report of its operations for the past two years as one of its last duties.

The report states between April 28, 1937, and April 18, 1939, the board, had closed 1,027 cases, covering 226,800 workers. Thirty cases still were pending April 18. There were nine strikes in Wisconsin as of April 28.

The board had 425 cases in volving charges of unfair labor practices, issued complaints in 75 of these, and decisions in 28. There were 204 such cases settled by mediation.

There were 187 strikes affecting 38,188 workers and 91 threatened strikes. The board settled 680 cases, covering 129,915 employes, by mediation. It arbitrated 63 cases, negotiated agreements in

The board conducted 59 elections to determine the bargaining agent, certified the bargaining agent in 6 cases. It conducted nine elec tions for the National Labor Relations Board.

Of 117 applications for listing asked by independent unions, the board granted 46, denied listing to 45 independents, and dismissed the applications of 26.

Of cases pending April 18, there were 18 involving charges of unfair labor practices, 18 complaints and six board decisions had been issued. Two arbitrations, one negotiation and one mediation case, were pending.


