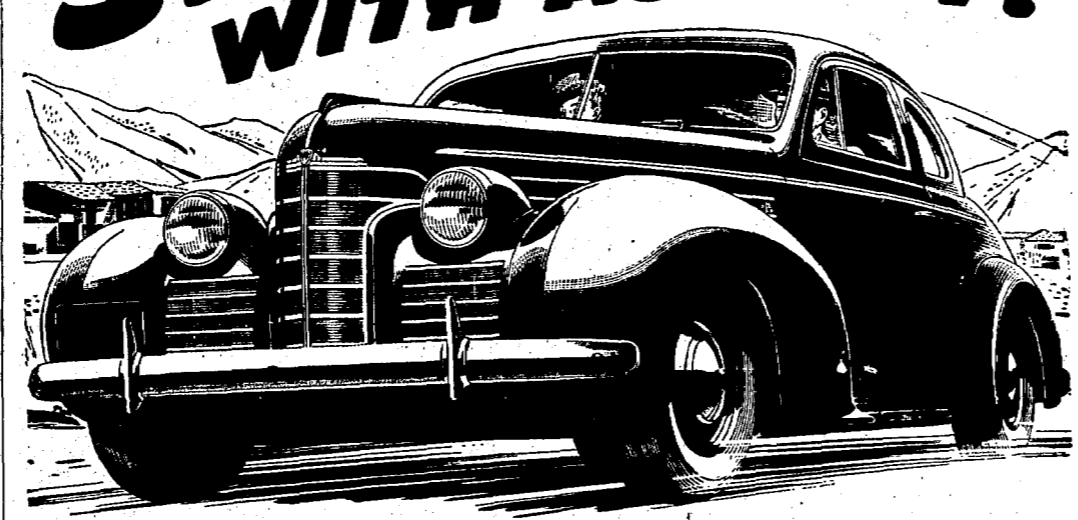

'No Stomach' in Midwest Fight With Dictators Not Wanted, Hicks Says

The middle western states, including Wisconsin, have "no stomach for fighting dictators," Prof. John D. Hicks of the University of Wisconsin history department contended Saturday.

Addressing the 10th annual Conference on the Teaching of History and the Social Sciences in the Memorial Union, Hicks pointed out, however, that the "middle west regrets the appeasement of dictators."

About 150 persons attended the conference which held a series of discussions during the day.

Hicks characterized the mid-western states as conservative and essentially agricultural.

"One direct result of the last war was a boom to middle western agriculture," he explained. "But soon after the boom, and long before the panic of 1929, came the crash."

"The middle west is frightened, and rightly frightened," he maintained, "at the specter of another cycle of expansion and contraction. It would like to see the world made safe for democracy but it has no hopes whatever that such a goal can be achieved by war."

Hicks saw little hope that a lasting farm-labor party would come out of the middle west.
