Hurley advised farmers not to be in too big a hurry about plowing up new seeding alfalfa fields which show only a partial stand, pointing out that "many times favorable weather after May 1 makes what appears to be a poor stand, look fairly good before May

Reseeding any field showing a 50 per cent stand with a nurse crop of small grain, which is cut for hay, will not change the classification of the field under the 1939 agricultural conservation program, according to J. W. Clark, assistant county agent. Where the stand is completely gone Clark suggests sowing soy-beans, sudan grass, or millet alone or in mixtures to comply with the conservation program. A mixture for reseeding where

there is a partial stand, recom-mended is six pounds of alfalfa, four pounds red clover, and three pounds timothy. A disc drill offers the easiest method of application providing the nurse crop is sown pecks an acre, and the grass seed spouts are set back of the discs. The seed should be covered with a cultipacker or harrow. If a disc drill is not available farmers are advised to sow in the oats, then disc lightly, following this the grass seed should be sowed and the ground harrowed lightly or cultipacked. Reseeding partially killed fields in this manner will insure a good crop of hay and will assist those who are attempting to comply with the conservation program, he said.


