## Bergen and McCarthy on Vallee's 500th Show for Current Sponsor



Prominent alumni of Rudy Vallee's variety hour headed by Edgar Bergen and his alter-ego, Charlie McCarthy, will hold a reunion to celebrate Vallee's 500th broadcast for the same sponsor at 6 o'clock tonight on WMAQ. The anniversary broadcast also will feature Lionel Barrymore in a dramatic role.

Vallee who made his debut on the NBC series Oct. 24, 1929, has been credited with developing more than 100 radio personalities including Bergen and McCarthy, Bob Burns, Tommy Riggs and Betty Lou, Clarence and Claude Stroud, and Joe Penner. He also has popularized scores of songs, among which are "Maine Stein Song," "Let's Put Out the Lights," "Goodnight Sweetheart," "Vagabond Lover," "Betty Co-Ed," "Vieni, Vieni," and "Violets."

# Don't Ask Mel Mazzer Why He's Leading Major Leagues in Hitting

NEW YORK—(U.P.)—Don't ask Mel Mazzer why he's leading the major leagues at bat, because poor Mel is more baffled by his hitting jamboree than are the pitchers he is belting.

Mazzer, right fielder of the St. Louis Browns, admits: "Every time I look at the figures and see my name up there around the .470 mark, I think I'm dreaming."

Mel sat in the Browns dugout at the stadium before Wednesday's game with the Yanks. He held a slender-handled bat in his hands. He looked at the bat reflectively and continued:

"This is a Harland Clift model bat. It weighs 35 ounces. It's exactly the same model and weight that I used last season when I hit .279—when I wasn't considered good enough by 'Gabby' Street to play regularly all season."

**Number Is Only Change**

"I haven't changed my stance at the plate. I'm still a left-handed hitter. I use the same old swing. The only thing that's different is the number I wear on my back. Last year it was 14; now it's 18. I've tried to dope it out, and the only thing I can figure is that maybe I'm doing something differently. I don't know anything about it. Or maybe since Fred Haney became manager and sent me in as a regular, my confidence has increased. He's a grand fellow—that Haney."

When Haney was asked about the Mazzer mystery, Fred said he believed Mel was waiting better for the good balls this season—particularly for "his pitch." It seems that nearly every batsman has a favorite pitch which he can wallop when it comes over. Haney said he didn't know which was Mel's favorite, and of course, if he did know, he wouldn't reveal it. Haney succeeded "Gabby" Street at the Browns' helm last November.

### Chicago Blackhawks Get New Players

CHICAGO—(U.P.)—The Chicago Blackhawks, who failed to clinch a National hockey league playoff berth the past season after capturing the Stanley Cup the previous year, last Wednesday announced the acquisition of seven new players for a \$35,000 cash outlay.

They obtained Forwards Bill Carse and George Allen from the New York Rangers, Phil Hergesheimer and Les Cunningham from the Cleveland Barons, Ab Demarco from Providence, Bob Carse, brother of Bill, and Johnny Chad from the Canadian amateur ranks.

The Hawks also announced that 12 promising young Canadian amateurs had been signed to contracts.
