Southhoff Praises Dane Farmers

Dane county farms and farmers, among the richest and most progressive in the nation, were praised by Harry Southhoff, former congressman, in an address Thursday night before the East Side Business Men's Assn.

Pointing out that Dane ranks first in Wisconsin in production of cows, chickens, alfalfa, tobacco, and milk, Southhoff said:

"Ever since Madison became the capital of the state in 1839 Dane county has prospered until we rank among the first 24 in agricultural wealth in the nation. Dane county undoubtedly ranks as high as any county in the state in the intelligence and education of its citizens.

"Fifty-nine per cent of our farmers have electric lights; 88 per cent subscribe to at least one newspaper; 85 per cent have radios, and 96 per cent have an auto."

Lauding the county's loyalty and the men it has contributed to the nation's war effort, he said that another world war is not far away and that the country again is being conditioned with propaganda identical to that used in the last one.

"I feel that Dane county should stand courageously and not be fooled by this seeping propaganda," he said. "We should keep our noses out of European affairs. I don't believe in jeopardizing the lives of our boys in any land-grabbing, cold-blooded affairs of today's modern gangsters in Europe."

1938 Hunters Were Thicker Than Ever

Wisconsin had more licensed hunters last year than in any previous year, the conservation department announced today. Final records on the hunting season just tabulated show a total of 270,527 hunters. Of these 209,470 had obtained general licenses and 1,037 carried special sportsmen's licenses.

Underground Capitol Parking Asked

Suggestions for an underground capitol parking lot or a state-owned lot and garage to solve the capitol square parking problem were voiced in the Madison and Wisconsin foundation bulletin today.

Pointing out that underground parking spaces are provided for congressmen in Washington, D. C., the bulletin suggested construction of a concrete garage under part of the square with tunnel entrances at W. Washington and Wisconsin aves. Parking there would be for capitol employes only, the bulletin suggested.

If such a plan is not possible the bulletin suggested the state purchase a parking lot and erect a garage near the square for state workers.

Rotary Club Hears of Other Nations

Under direction of a committee of 10, all of whom were born on foreign soil, the Rotary club heard from representatives of England, Australia, and Turkey at their weekly meeting in the Lorraine hotel Thursday noon.
