

# British Empire Day To Be Theme Of Radio Broadcast

### Official Greeting Song To King And Queen To Have Premiere Monday; Pearce To Study Picnics

"Our Canada from Sea to Sea," Canada's official greeting to British Royalty, will have its radio premiere on Monday at 9:00 p. m. The song was written expressly for the visit by Gena Branscombe, young Canadian composer.

The entire program conducted by Marek Webster, will be dedicated to British Empire Day, which is May 24, the birthday of Queen Victoria. Opening number will be a medley of British Empire marches, including "British Grenadiers," "Blue Bells of Scotland," "Wearin' of the Green," "Men of Harlech" and "Maple Leaf Forever."

A second medley, of Scottish marches, will include "The Campbells Are Comin'," "Roamin' in the Gloamin'" "Love a Lassie" and "My Bonnie Dundee." Weber's violin solo will be "Londonderry Air" and Lullaby Lady Opal Craven's selection will be the favorite Welsh lullaby, "All Through the Night."

Al Pearce and his Gang, having settled such weighty and timely problems as spring fever, fishing and the institution of the drive-in, will turn their attention to the equally important subject of "Picnics" during their program on W.E.A.F. Monday from 7 to 7:30 p. m.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt, addressing the first Retailers National Forum in the Mayflower hotel, Washington, D. CRIDERSVILLE, May 22.—Carl A. Hutchens, superintendent of local public schools for the past two years, has been retained for a two-year period, according to action taken by the district board of education, it was announced by Harry Kiser, president of the board.

Hutchens was named to the office when A. W. Shultz did not seek reappointment at the start of the 1938-39 school year. Shultz was injured fatally in an automobile accident last summer. The salary to be received by Hutchens was not disclosed.

Roger Downing, who completed his first year as athletic director and mathematics teacher, also was retained for a two-year period and Nelson Young, of Leesburg, Ind., was hired as music teacher under a one-year contract. Miss Stella Steiner also was retained as teacher of English and Home economics.

L. W. Jordan and Allen Bishop did not file applications for reappointment. Their vacancies are to be filled later by the board. Mrs. Yvonne Wauben, Miss Helen Hall, Miss Wanda Geist and James Strassburg, elementary school teachers were rehired.

Kiser also disclosed that the board of education had made application with the state department of education to create a vocational agricultural class in the school. The state department has not ruled on the application.

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## Bob Burns Starring In New Comedy Riot At The Sigma

### "I'm From Missouri" Is Title Of Hilarious Film; Power And Faye Head Quilna Hit

"I'm From Missouri," Bob Burns' latest comedy now showing at the Sigma, is chiefly concerned with the adventures of a rough-hewn Missouri mule-raiser and his social climbing wife in London society. Gladys George is seen as his lovely wife and Judith Barrett and William Henry furnish the young romantic leads.

Tyrone Power and Alice Faye, the romantic stars of Irving Berlin's "Alexander's Ragtime Band" are co-starred with Al Jolson, singing again in his inimitable way his memory laden song hits of yesterday, in the film, "Rose of Washington Square," which is current at the Quilna.

"Three Smart Girls Grow Up" the picture at the Ohio, shows Deanna Durbin in the role "match-maker." In the film she tries all sorts of tricks to fix up the love affairs of her two lovely sisters, portrayed by Nan Grey and Helen Parrish. In doing this she causes quite a bit of confusion but in the end everything turns out for the best. Charles Winninger, Robert Cummings and William Lundigan are in supporting roles.

"The Oklahoma Kid," starring Deanna Durbin in the role of a girl who falls in love with a cowboy, is the all-technicolor drama of "Smart Kings," "Kentucky" is the title of the picture which stars Richard Greene and Loretta Young with Walter Brennan. This is the story of the lives of two families whose whole world is built around pure bred race horses.

Bob Burns' inimitable brand of homespun humor fits him perfectly for his latest screen role, that of Missouri mule magnate on the loose in London society, which he plays in "I'm From Missouri." In the new comedy at the Sigma theatre, Bob once again cashes in on his unique ability to portray Mr. Average American!

Bob's riotous adventures in "I'm From Missouri" stem from two principal causes: The British army's decision to substitute tractors for mules in certain of its units, and the social ambitions of Mrs. Bob (in this case Gladys George). Always a man to take a situation in hand, the sage of Criddersville suddenly finds himself in swankiest Mayfair, grappling to the death with society leaders and government officials.

From the hilarious moment at the opening of the picture, when Burns' pampered mules "crash" the elaborate ceremony arranged by Miss George for the dedication of the new country club, the Missouri farmer is caught between his devotion to the animals and his love for his wife. When the decision of the British army threatens his friends and himself with ruin, he backs up both the mules and his family for a trip to London.

Bob Burns abroad is even funnier than B. B. at home, if such a thing can be visualized. His frank pursuit of his aims, his dry comments on the passing scene and his down-to-earth attitude toward other people, all stand out in marked contrast to the fussy snobbishness of his wife and the shallow sophistication of international society.

"I'm From Missouri" reaches a high state of excitement with the arrival of Burns and Miss George in London. Bob begins his campaign to win British officialdom over to mules, while his wife frantically sets out to seal the social ladder. At the top, she unexpectedly

encounters an old friend whose influence saves the day for them all.

With the glorious tradition of the Blue Grass country as its background, and a love that is all fire and pride as its theme, "Kentucky," a Technicolor production, is playing at the Lyric theatre.

Much of "Kentucky" was filmed on location in the heart of the Blue Grass state, and the Kentucky Derby itself furnishes a spectacular climax.

Loretta Young and Richard Greene are seen in the leading roles, and it is their love which brings peace to two great families who have hated each other bitterly since the Civil war. Loretta is seen as Sally Goodwin and Greene plays the role of Jack Dillon. The Goodwins and the Dillons are the families that have been feuding.

The cast also features Walter Brennan, Academy Award winner, in the role of Peter Goodwin, Sally's uncle, and the greatest expert on horseflesh in Kentucky.

Others included in the film are Douglas Drumhille, Karen Morley and Moroni Olsen. David Butler directed from a seven play by Lamar Trotti and John Tanton. Darryl F. Zanuck was in charge of production.

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## FINAL SESSION DRAWING NEAR

### Ohio General Assembly Starts What May Be Last Full Week

COLUMBUS, O., May 22.—(AP) —The Ohio general assembly opened today what its leaders hoped would be the last full week of a five-month session, which had been expected to last only about half that long.

The senate scheduled a working session for tonight while the house meets in "skeleton" session to receive a committee recommendation on poor relief administration.

Appropriations, anti-graft legislation, civil service commission reorganization and a cleanup of relief program measures were on the senate agenda for this week. The house probably will act on reorganization of the welfare department and public institutional building authority, Ohio river anti-pollution pact and its last relief measure.

A recess was planned on Thursday or Friday by both branches until the following Wednesday. Two or three days were predicted next week for winding up the legislature's work and then a final session, for bill-signing and other details, about June 12.

## CUSTODIAN OF CLUB JAILED AFTER SLAYING

PORTSMOUTH, O., May 22.—(AP) —Jailed in the fatal shooting of Paul Addis, 28, during a scuffle, R. L. Shumate, 54, custodian of the Portsmouth yacht club, sought today to have a murder charge against him dismissed on the ground that he acted in self-defense.

Attorneys Chester Fitch and Harry Miller said they would ask dismissal of the charge in the court of municipal Judge Horace Small, or at least a reduction to one of less degree.

Police Chief Harry Sheets quoted Shumate, a former patrolman and retired assistant fire chief here, as saying he shot Addis, a Scioto highway employe, when Addis and Harry Lee attacked him after he had ordered them and two companions from the club wharf yesterday because they were not members.

A club custodian, Shumate had police powers and was permitted to carry a gun, Sheets said, and the others were not taken into custody.
